MORE RIFLES SEIZED BY LONDON POLICE

London June 10—The police raided a warehouse in London tonight and discovered between 3,000 and 4,000 rifles and a similar number of bayonets packed in boxes ready for shipment.

The raid was a sequel to the seizure of a consignment of rifles and bayonets on board a steamer arriving at Dublin, June 6 from Liverpool. This consignment was addressed to Baron Farnham, an Irish peer at his country seat in County Cavan and were traced to the same warehouse.

Tories Fear an Election Says Hon. Dr. Pugsley

Ex-Minister of Public Works Reviews Work of the Recent Session of Parliament--The Borden-Nationalist Alliance Denounced--Liberals Protested Against the Tyrannical Course of the Government on the Naval Bill--The Insult to Sir Wilfrid Laurier

Hon. William Pugsley, representative of the City of St. John in the House of Commons, and ex-minister of public works, was asked last evening by The Telegraph for his views on some of the important issues which have come before one of the most memorable sessions of the Canadian House. Dr. Pugsley said:

"With regard to the naval bill, it has met with the fate which every reasonable man who gave due consideration to the subject realized from the outset. In the first place everyone was aware that the attempt of the government to depart from the policy which had been approved by the House of Commons at the session of 1909 for the establishment of a Canadian navy was not the result of any patriotic desire to help the empire but was an unpatriotic attempt to get out of the hole into which the government had fallen by reason of the advances which had been made to the Nationalist party prior to the general election of 1911. It will be remembered that the Nationalist party, led by Mr. Bourassa, was opposed to doing anything for naval defence outside of Canadian waters, and they especially insisted that no step in this direction, either by the establishment of a Canadian navy or by contribution, should be taken until the question was first submitted to the people. As a result of this unholy alliance the Nationalists, led by Mr. Monk, late minister of public works, lent most effective aid towards the defeat of the late government and when the cabinet was formed Mr. Monk received one

of the most important portfolios and was given the right of selection of his colleagues from the Province of Quebec.

Mr. Borden then conceived the idea of discovering an emergency under the pretext of which he could satisfy the jingo element in his party by giving aid to the imperial navy by a contribution of battleships and at the same time satisfy the Nationalists by enabling them to tell the people of Quebec, who had been induced to give support to the government on a Nationalist platform, that contribution in reality had meant nothing more than one contribution, that as their newspapers are now saying the money would be paid largely by Ontario and the West, and their young men of Quebec would not be ordered away to fight English battles.

WHY MR. MONK RESIGNED.

So strong, however, had been the pledge given by Mr. Monk on behalf of the Conservative party that no contribution should be made without the people being consulted, that he resigned when the expedient of a contribution was determined upon. His colleagues in the government, however, Mr. Pelletier and Mr. Nantel, disregarded their pledges and continued to hold office. The course of the government in this breaking up of the unanimity of parliament on the naval question as expressed by resolution in 1909, and to drag the question into the mire of party politics, was most deplorable, both from the standpoint of Canada and the empire. It was peculiarly for-

tunate that the first lord of the admiralty, by the memorandum which he gave to Mr. Borden, was drawn into the controversy and made to appear as dictating to the parliament and people of Canada as to the course to be pursued. The Liberal speakers, however, were able to show beyond question that the admiralty had both in 1907 and 1911, at the imperial conferences, approved of the creation of local navies by both Australia and Canada and that the facts stated in the memorandum, as well as the speeches of the prime minister of Great Britain and first lord of the admiralty, made in parliament and elsewhere, really showed that there was no emergency and therefore no ground whatever for departing from the sound Canadian and imperial policy which had been laid down and under which Australia has gone steadily forward towards the creation of her own navy to be built as far as possible in Australia and to be manned and controlled by the Australian government, the fleet to be available for the defence of Australia and of her trade routes and to be at the same time available whenever the necessity might arise for the common defence of the empire.

CANADA MAKING START.

Canada in good faith started out along the same line when the full approval of the British admiralty, the plans and specifications for ten war vessels were prepared with admiralty supervision and tenders called for their construction prior to the general elections of 1911. The view of the Liberal members of parliament was that the admiralty memorandum showed that there was no emergency but that a condition existed the same as in 1911, which made it desirable that the overseas dominions should take upon themselves the burden of protecting the coast and the trade routes and so enable the imperial government to concentrate its fleets in home waters. When Mr. Borden submitted the government resolution for contribution of three dreadnoughts, the Liberal party as represented in parliament, firmly resisted the proposal and took strong grounds in favor of carrying out the resolution passed at the session of 1909. At the same time having in view the increased revenues they declared that the proper course to pursue was to proceed as speedily as possible for the creation of two fleet units, one to be stationed in the Atlantic and the other in the Pacific, the vessels to be built as far as possible in Canada and to be the same as the ships of Australia, manned and controlled by Canada.

THE FIGHT IN PARLIAMENT

The government tried to force through the bill by the most unparliamentary methods, and by the applications of brute force endeavoring to reduce the opposition to a state of physical weakness, but they did not count upon the magnificent fighting force of the opposition. For two weeks the house sat continuously.
