Mr. Thomas was one of the "war consuls" appointed by Abraham Lin coln during the War of Secession and officiated in Sweden where he observed closely the characteristics of the people of the country which he afterward embodied in a book "Sweden and the Swedes." He became con cinced that they would make settlers for Maine. In 1870 through his efforts the Maine legislature ordered him to recruit a colony Sweden which he did, landing people at Halifax and taking then to Maine via Digby, St. John, Fredericton and Andover, proceeding from this city by tow-boat. The colony was so successful that upwards of six thousand Swedish people now reside in Maine.

It was the success of his venture that induced the New Brunswick government to establish a colony Danes near Grand Falls at the place now called New Denmark.
