LUMBER JACK KILLED**TWO DEPUTY SHERIFFS**

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., June 1 -
Two deputy sheriffs are dead and
one man is seriously wounded as the
result of a fight late Friday night at
Brimley, Mich., 12 miles from here.

Jos. Tovens, a prisoner who was in
custody of Deputy Sheriffs Jas. Sut-
ton and Alfred Scribner of Brimley,
slipped his hand from his handcuffs
and, drawing a revolver, turned it on
both men and shot them dead.

Tovens is a Russian lumberjack,
wanted for stabbing Joe Teeple dur-
ing a fight at Brimley on Friday. To-
vens made his escape and is hiding
somewhere in the woods.

A posse of lumberjacks, farmers
and rivermen, armed with axes, rifles
pitchforks, cant-hooks and anything
they could lay their hands on, are
scouring the woods.

Sheriff Bone and five deputies have
gone to join the search and protect
Tovens in case he is found. Brimley
is in a high pitch of excitement and
officials fear for Tovens' safety.

E. N. RHODES THE**LIKELY CHOICE**

Ottawa, June 10—The office of soli-
citor general, which has been vacant
since the present government assumed
office, will probably be filled short-
ly.

Premier Borden's choice for the po-
sition is E. N. Rhodes, member for
Cumberland, Arthur Meighen, M. P.,
for Portage La Prairie, who has
been the government's ablest apolo-
gist in debate during the past session,
is the choice of Hon. Robert Rogers
and the western Conservatives, A.
C. Boyce, M. P., for West Algoma,
has the support of a large number of
Ontario Conservatives, and Albert
Seigny, Nationalist-Conservative as-
pirant for the office from Quebec.

So far the cabinet has not been
able to agree on a choice among the
rival claimants for preferment. It is
probable, however, that Mr. Borden
will be given the appointment. Mr.
Meighen will likely have to wait for
his reward at some later date.

Mr. Boyer will, it is understood,
accept one of the vacant Ontario
judgeships.

TO PERPETRATE**HISTORIC SPOTS**

Fort Nashwaak Erected by Villebon in
1632, Included in the
List

the jurisdiction of the Quebec Battle-
fields Commission to the Maritime
Provinces. The commission receives
a grant of \$100,000, all of which is
being expended in the vicinity of
Quebec. There are many historic
spots in old Acadia which have wit-
nessed heroic deeds and should be
perpetuated. They have been too
long neglected and the changes of
every season steals something from
what could have remained standing
records of the stirring events that
marked the first two hundred years
of European settlement of our coun-
try. A memorial recently presented
to the government contained a list of
historic places, including the follow-
ing:

ST. JOHN RIVER.—The River St.
John is the home of Indian villages
and settlements. The Indians had a
stockade at Fort Nerepis in 1653 and
it was occupied by Boishebert in 1675
and strengthened by him.

"Fort Nashwaak, built by Villebon
in 1692, besieged by the British in
1696, was placed on the point between
the Nashwaak and the St. John. Its
site has been washed away. Opposite
was St. Anne's Point, where a large
French village existed. The grave-
yard is supposed to be in the shrub-
bery west of Government House and
the church was near it. A graveyard
with probably the oldest stone table-
ts in Acadia, exists a mile further
down stream. At Meductic (Lower
Woodstock) was an Indian village
and fort. It was at one time the
most important place on the river.

"Aucapac, at Springhill, seven miles
above Fredericton, was an important
Indian Village. It possessed a
church and residence of the Indian
missionary. The site was sold by the
Indians in 1794."

GIBSON NEWS

Gibson, June 12—Mr. George Mars-

York Mill. He was struck on the leg
with a heavy deal, just above the
ankle. Mr. Marston will be confined
to his home for some time.

road-making and have finished on
the Marysville road as far as the Mc-
Connell Bridge and as far on the
front road as the Nashwaak Bridge.
They are now working in Barker's
Point towards the main river.

Mr. William Rice of Bristol, N. H.
arrived in Gibson yesterday. It is
reported that he intends moving here
to reside and expects to buy the
Dickson property at Barker's Point,
from the Fredericton & Grand Lake
Railway.

Mr. Thomas was one of the "war
consuls" appointed by Abraham Lin-
coln during the War of Secession and
officialized in Sweden where he ob-
served closely the characteristics of
the people of the country which he
afterward embodied in a book "Swed-
en and the Swedes." He became con-
vinced that they would make good
settlers for Maine. In 1870 through
his efforts the Maine legislature or-
dered him to recruit a colony in
Sweden which he did, landing the
people at Halifax and taking them
to Maine via Digby, St. John, Fred-
erickton and Andover, proceeding from
this city by tow-boat. The colony
was so successful that upwards of
six thousand Swedish people now
reside in Maine.

It was the success of his venture
that induced the New Brunswick gov-
ernment to establish a colony of
Danes near Grand Falls at the place
now called New Denmark.

TRYING TO KEEP**PEACE IN BALKANS**

London, June 10—The great powers
are exerting every effort to prevent
the Balkan states from flying at
each others throats, and reports
from Vienna indicate with some suc-
cess. Russia and Germany particu-
larly, are busy counselling peace and
moderation, and the French govern-
ment is supporting them, and, as
the principal creditor, is giving both
Serbia and Bulgaria clear warning
that in the event of war no finan-
cial assistance will be forthcoming
either before or after hostilities.
