THE WEATHER.

Maritime—Fresh winds a few local showers but mostly fair.

BAND TONIGHT

CONCRETE DEFECTIVE

Defective concrete has been discovered in some of the St. John & Quebec Railway culverts. At Springhill a large culvert has been found defective and must be replaced.

FIRE NEAR CITY.

There was a brush fire near Brick Kiln Road yesterday afternoon which threatened property of Coles Kitchen and others. The damage is reported to be small.

FIRE ALARM OUT OF ORDER

There was much confusion yesterday afternoon in the fire alarm which sounded when box 45 was rung. The whistles at the lighting station and pumping station did not sound the alarm properly.

SMALL FIRE.

There was a small fire at 234 King street this afternoon at two o'clock for which the firemen were called out by an alarm from Box 17. The dwelling was next the Reformed Baptist Church. The blaze was on the roof and was put out by means of a hand extinguisher.

The next dangerous period will be in October.

CORONER'S INQUEST
IN MURDER CASE
AT GAGETOWN

An Eye Witness Tells How Sabatas, the Indian Came to His Death---
Dr. Casells Conducting Post Mortem Examination

Coroner John F. Hoben commenced an inquest at Gagetown yesterday over the body of Gabriel Sabatas, the Indian who came to his death on Monday by a blow from a slab in the hands of Charles Medley McIntyre. The evidence of four witnesses was taken after which an adjournment was made until Friday to await the result of the post mortem examination now being made by Dr. Casells. The most important evidence given was that of Charles Medley McIntyre, father-in-law of the accused, who was an eye witness of the tragedy. He swore that Sabatas and the accused had got into a slight altercation over their work. McIntyre was engaged in cutting slabs into laths, while Sabatas job was to remove the slabs from the tail ender and place them on the run. The Indian it seems had thrown some edging on top of the slabs, and this had annoyed McIntyre who ordered the Indian to remove them. The Indian paid no attention to him, and McIntyre himself removed the edgings. He cut up what slabs there were on the run and ordered Sabatas to put back the edgings. This the Indian refused to do and McIntyre becoming enraged grabbed a slab out of the witness hand and struck the Indian a blow over the head felling him to the floor. The accused then made a hasty exit from the place. The stick which he used in striking McIntyre was described as being 3 1/2 feet long, 3 1/2 by 2 inches at one end and 1 1/2 x 2 inches at the other. The other witnesses were James Briggs, Frank Hamilton, and Frank Sabatas. They all swore that they saw the accused strike the blow which killed Sabatas.

The jury is composed of Thomas B. Burpee, Charles Cooper, Charles Coy, Henry Estrabrooks, Henry Coy, Darcy Brown and J. W. McMullin.

FOUNDER OF NEW
SWEDEN AGAIN IN
FREDERICTON

W. W. Thomas Who Last Was Here in 1870 With Party of Swedish Settlers Arrived Last Night---
Interesting History

W. W. Thomas of Stockholm, Me., founder of the Swedish settlement of New Sweden in Northern Maine and during three administrations United States plenipotentiary and minister extraordinary to Sweden and Norway, arrived in the city last night and is at the Barker House. Mr. Thomas is here on private business and will leave the city tomorrow.

It is almost forty-three years since he has been in Fredericton last, passing through this city in July 1870 with a party of Swedes, fifty-one of all ages, whom he planted in the woods eight miles from Caribou, Me. Mr. Thomas remarked to a reporter for The Mail that at that time he had greatly admired Fredericton's natural beauty which he observed the city still possessed.

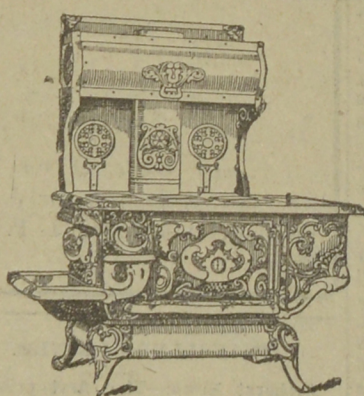

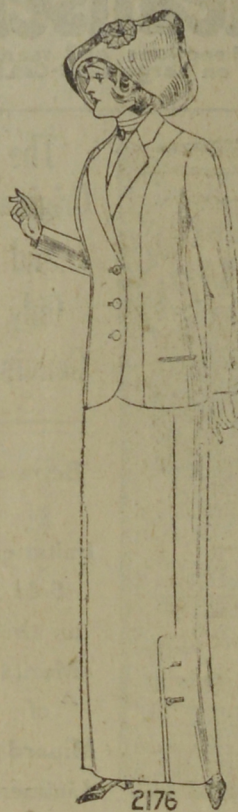
