**GERMAN BUSINESS MEN
HERE ON AUGUST 22**

A large group of influential business men of Germany will spend seven weeks in Canada during the latter part of June and the months of July and August. They will visit St. John, Moncton, Fredericton and other points in New Brunswick, arriving in this province about the middle of August.

The Mail has received from The Illustrated Zeitung of Leipzig, the complete itinerary of the party, which will leave Bremen on June 24, arrive in Montreal on July 6, make a tour of Western Canada, return and arrive in St. John on August 16, concluding with a banquet in Fredericton on August 22 and departing from Rimouski the next day. The itinerary after August 15 will be as follows:

St. John:
Aug. 15—Afternoon: Departure from Montreal for the eastern provinces (New Brunswick, Nova Scotia.)
Aug. 16—Day of rest, chance for sport, (fishing, hunting.)

Aug. 17-22—Tour through the eastern provinces, sight-seeing in Halifax, Moncton, Fredericton and other note-worthy towns and inspection of their industries. The program for the different towns is being arranged with the municipalities and governments and will be announced later.
Aug. 22—Fredericton, concluding banquet.

Aug. 23—Departure for Rimouski for those sailing for Europe on the Empress of Ireland of the C.P.R., on August 24.

This tour of Canada follows as a result of a visit made last year by Court Councillor Horst Wober of the Illustrirte Zeitung. Wherever he went he was greatly impressed with the country and on his return to Germany he published a report of all he had seen and experienced during a three months' tour. A special edition of his famous journal devoted to Canada will be issued very soon, and will be followed by this business men's trip to Canada by leading German personages of every field of activity.

The business men's trip is a unique enterprise, for it is the first time that such a party of representative Germans will visit this country and be officially received by the governments of the provinces and municipal authorities. It certainly speaks well for The Illustrirte Zeitung that immediately upon the suggestion of the trip, an honorary committee was formed in Germany to promote the idea. From the list of personages and associations that are giving their support it is clear that the affair will be of high international importance.

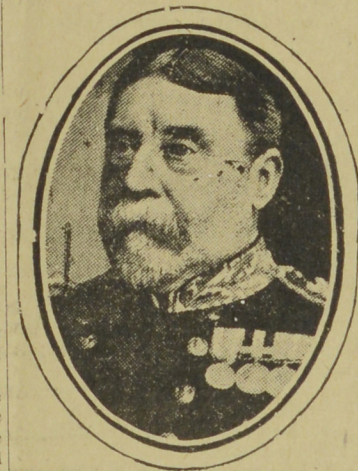

**SIR ARCHIBALD
DOUGLAS DEAD
IN ENGLAND**

London, March 13—The 'Times' announces that Admiral Sir Archibald Douglas, G.C.B., died yesterday at Newham Hants in his 71st year. At the end of last year he underwent a serious operation and though he had been able to do a certain amount of work he never really recovered.

Of high professional attainments and wide experience, Sir Archibald Douglas was a diligent worker and served loyally and ably in many responsible posts. His genial and generous disposition secured for him the regard and respect of a wide circle of friends by whom he will be sincerely mourned.

Admiral Sir Archibald Lucius Douglas, A.D.C., K.C.P., G.C.V.O., G.C.B., F.R.C.L., Knight of the Legion of Honor, second son of the late George Mellis, D. M.D., and Charlotte, daughter of the late Archibald Campbell, Queen's notary was born at Quebec on February 8, 1842. He entered the Quebec High School where he pursued the usual course of studies and in April of 1856 entered the Royal Navy as a cadet on the nomination of Sir E. W. Head, Governor-General of Canada.



In 1861 he was promoted to the rank of sub-lieutenant, receiving the rank of lieutenant in 1862. He first saw active service in 1860 with the Naval Brigade in the Congo and Gambia as a gunnery lieutenant and later in 1866 during the Fenian Raid commanded a gunboat on the Canadian lakes. He was a staff officer on H.M.S. Cambridge for three and a half years and in 1872 was appointed commander and became instructor in the use of Harvey's torpedo to the Channel and reserve fleets.

In 1873 he was appointed commander of the mission to instruct the Japanese navy. From 1873 to 1875 he was commander of the Imperial Japanese Naval College at Yedo and won the Japanese Order of the Rising Sun; in 1880 was promoted to the rank of captain and in 1884 commanded the 'Seraphis' during the Soudan expedition winning thereby the Khedive bronze medal. He was made rear-admiral in 1895 and commanded the East Indies fleet in 1898 and 1899 from which latter date until 1902 he was second Lord of the Admiralty, having been made vice-admiral in 1901. He commanded the North American and West Indian stations from 1902 to 1904 and the Portsmouth station from 1905 to 1907 when he retired from the service.

Sir Archibald Douglas has several times visited Canada during recent years, and he took a great interest in the Montreal harbor works.

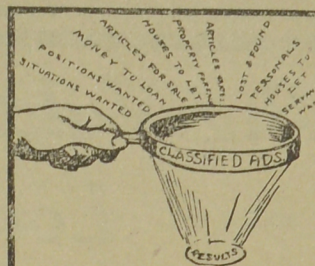
British ministry surprised at failure of state department to notify it regarding the change of attitude toward Chinese loan.

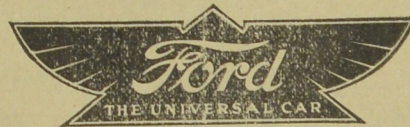
