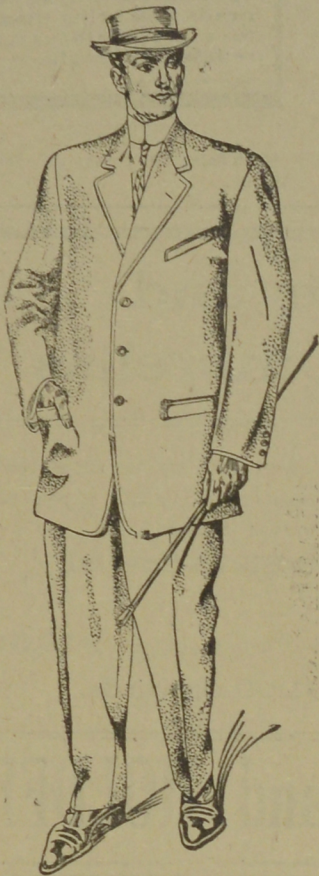


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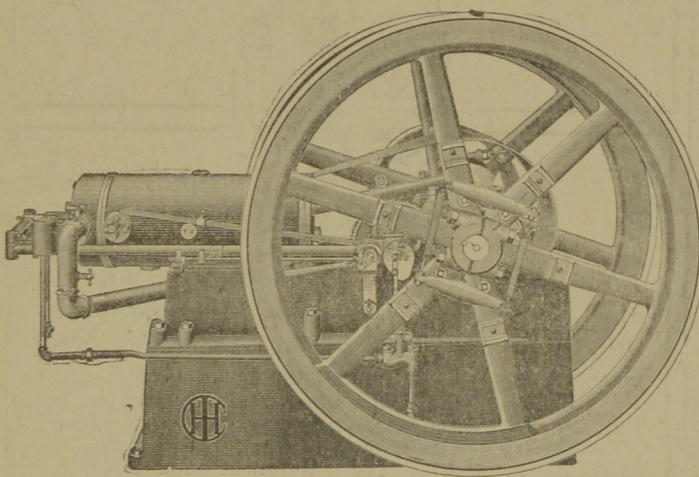

IMPORT RATE CASE REOPENED

Washington, D. C., March 25—The question of differential freight rates which has long agitated the commercial and transportation interests centering in New York, Boston, Philadelphia and Baltimore, was re-opened by argument today by the Interstate Commerce Commission. The reopening of the case at this time is due to the complaint of Philadelphia, which city has lodged a strong protest with the commission against Boston being allowed to operate on a 70-cent basis on wetbound import freight pending final disposition of the case. New York and Baltimore have joined Philadelphia in an effort to force the New England port back to its original 75-cent rate.

Philadelphia petitions the commission either to reverse its former decision and place Boston on a parity with New York or else restore the parity basis at all ports until the whole question of differentials, both import and export, is settled. Philadelphia shippers contend that a 70-cent rate at Boston is injurious to Philadelphia's import trade, as the 69-cent rate obtaining in Philadelphia is not advantageous enough to offset the advantages enjoyed by Boston.

CORNELL'S MILLER LOWERS RECORD MADE LAST WEEK

John Paul Jones Captain of Track Team Doing Some Remarkable Work on Board Track

Ithaca, G. Y., March 24—Capt John Paul Jones, the Cornell world's record miler is lowering his own record every week in practice. Thursday he ran a mile on the board track in 4m. 21 1-5s., lowering his own record, made last week of 4m. 22s. The full Cornell track team leaves today to meet Michigan at Ann Arbor in the last indoor meet of the season.

WILL CODERRE RESIGN FROM THE CABINET?

(Montreal Witness.)

There is a persistent rumor to the effect that the Hon. Mr. Coderre, secretary of state, is not able to fulfill the duties of his position on account of illness, and will resign his position in the cabinet. Whether there is substantial ground for this or not, it is hard to say; he was away from the House all last week, while the Liberals were anxiously demanding his presence that they might go into the details of election charges that involved the validity of his election in Hochelaga. Yesterday he appeared in the House to hear the charges. These charges were sworn to by a couple of Conservative leaders before a Conservative lawyer. There was, therefore, no partisan spirit back of them. They were made by confessed blackmailers who either perjured themselves at the time or else, on obtaining the positions of which they were in quest, quickly turned perjurers to deny them. This is an awkward position into which Mr. Coderre has got. It would have been still more serious had his illness not secured a delay from his political opponents in making public the charge until the accusers could be got to forswear themselves in his interests. The illness added to the seriousness of the charges, have led to this rumor that he will resign.

It was only with the greatest difficulty that, on the resignation of Mr. Monk, the government could find a person who was territorially and racially qualified for the position of minister. To satisfy these two requirements, and secure for Montreal and the French-Canadian people their proportion of representation in the cabinet, the government was obliged to take a man who had not established any record as a statesman. If Mr. Coderre's place is to be filled, it will be impossible for the government to find another French-Canadian in the Montreal district to replace him, with the result that either the district of Montreal or the French-Canadian race will lose what has been considered its share of representation in the cabinet. The government will, therefore, have to lose one of these two qualifications in making its appointment. The only question is, which? If they disregard the territorial requirement, they will probably have the whole of the rest of the province to look to for cabinet material. They have not, however, among their supporters, a single French-Canadian of the first rank that they could elevate to the honor. Besides this, there are few of the French-Canadian constituencies that they now hold that they would, even for a moment, consider throwing open for re-contestation.

Under the circumstances it seems that the government's only choice is to hold to the territorial qualification and disregard the racial qualification. This would allow them to secure a man of more than the ordinary ability. It was a surprise to all when Mr. Ames' name did not appear in the first announcement of Mr. Borden's cabinet, for certainly there were few men who did more to defeat the late Liberal government than Mr. Ames. As he made his campaign on the Liberals throughout Quebec and Ontario, on the ground that corruption and favoritism were rampant, it was hoped that his presence in the Borden cabinet would help to check such work as was attributed to some members of the Liberal cabinet and is now as freely attributed to their successors. Mr. Ames is undoubtedly the very embodiment of the sentiment of the English-speaking Conservatives of this province, and if on account of health or disqualification Mr. Coderre should have to resign, Mr. Ames would be the outstanding man for the position.

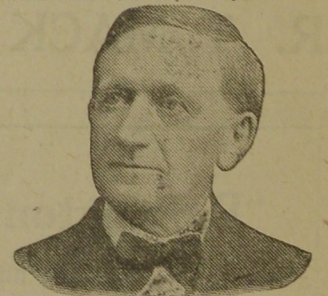
