## CATHEDRAL

CHIMES CAST AND  
AWAIT TESTING

Expected to be Installed Early in Summer---Easter Elections in Anglican Congregations Took Place Yesterday

The annual Easter Monday elections took place in the various Anglican congregations of the city and vicinity yesterday afternoon and last evening. Christchurch Cathedral congregation met at the Church Hall Very Rev. Dean Schofield presiding. Sidesmen and delegates to the diocesan synod were appointed and the financial statement presented. Assets are valued at \$146,672.22, of which real estate makes up \$85,862.99. A valuation of \$65,900 is placed upon the Cathedral building. A small credit balance is shown.

## CHIMES ARE COMPLETED.

Word has been received from England that the fifteen bells which are to replace those of the chimes destroyed in the fire of 1911 have been cast at the works in England and now await testing. If the tests prove satisfactory the bells will be shipped as soon as possible and are expected to be installed and in use early in the summer.


