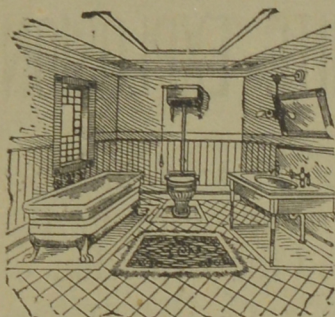

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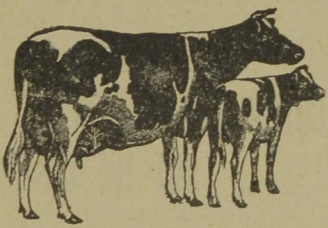

CHURCH WORKERS TO CONSIDER EUGENICS

Cleveland, O., March 7—Eugenics and mothercraft will be exhaustively discussed by the Religious Education Association at its tenth annual meeting in this city next week. It will be the first time that these subjects have received the attention of the association, which is made up of leaders of all Protestant bodies, and dies, and corresponds to the National Education Association in the secular field of education.

The program for the coming meeting provides for conferences on schools for the training of laymen and laywomen in Christian work. Expecting a considerable delegation from Canada, the association has also planned a conference of Canadian church workers, the first to be held.

Civic leaders in moral and political progress will take part in the conference, as well as many noted religious workers. The convention will last four days. It will embrace more than thirty sessions, and have upwards of two hundred speakers, among them President Judson of the University of Chicago, who is also president of the association. President Falconer of the University of Toronto; President Vincent of the University of Minnesota; Dean Sumner of the University of Chicago, who is also head of Chicago's vice commission, and Dr. Edgar V. Mullins of the Southern Baptist Seminary at Louisville.

Maude Adams may give an operatic performance at Harvard this year on the same order as her performance of "Joan of Arc."

GONE WEST—Frank L. Cooper, who has made himself a very popular clerk at R. M. Campbell's dry goods store left for Kansas City on Tuesday to take a position in the business conducted there by his brother Fred. He deserves all success.

NAW SHOP—Wilmot Guion, the popular surveyor and grocery-man is fitting up a shop and office opposite the Springhill Hotel. During the balmy days of summer Wilmot will therefore be found when not on the rafting grounds in this cozy little building.

CHEAP HAY—Tuesday was a great hay day at the market, some fifty loads being on sale. Seven and eight dollars per ton were asked while five and six were offered. Several loads were taken home, the farmers not being willing to sell at such a low price.

RISE IN PORK—A few days since Conductor Sterling's train on the C. P. R. struck a large hog at one of the way stations. The pig was thrown on top of a snow drift with both hind legs broken.

I A'D TO REST—All that was mortal of the late Marshal Ritchey was borne to the grave on Saturday last the silent procession forming at two o'clock. Then followed the mourners and a very large number of citizens. The clergymen and civic officials attended in a body.

LEGISLATURE OPENS—Although

the weather was very severe yet long before the time for the opening of the House on Thursday, the galleries were thronged. Shortly before three o'clock the guard-of-honor from the Infantry School under the command of Capt. Hemming and Lieutenants Carpenter and Boulter preceded by the band took up a position on Parliament Square. Several of the members gathered in the legislative chamber when Speaker Wulke took the chair and Rev. Dr. McLeod offered prayer. The booming of the cannon announced the arrival of His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, Sir Leonard Tilley. He proceeded to the council chamber, demanded the attendance of the members of the House of Assembly and formally opened the session.

(The late Hon. A. G. Blair was then premier of New Brunswick and the late Hon. D. L. Hannington was the leader of the opposition. The Legislative Council was abolished at that session and an election being held a few months later the government was handsomely sustained.)

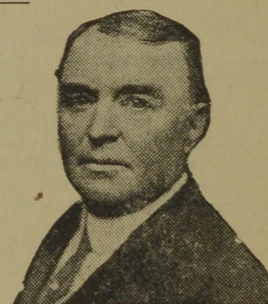
