CITY ELECTIONS

The Election for Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Fredericton for the ensuing year will be held on MONDAY 10th DAY OF MARCH NEXT at the following places viz:
Division No. 1.—For all voters residing or owning property above the centre line of Carleton Street prolonged, at or near the City Hall in the said City.

Division No. 2.—For all voters residing or owning property in the remainder of the said City not included in Division No. 1., at or near the County Court House in the said City. Polls will be opened at the above named places at nine o'clock a.m., of the said day of Election, and will close at the hour of four o'clock p.m. of the same day.

Nominations for the office of Mayor or Aldermen must be filed in the office of the City Clerk, City Hall, on or before four o'clock on MONDAY the 3rd day of MARCH next, and must be signed by at least two qualified Electors and the signatures attested to under oath.

Forms for Nomination may be procured at the City Clerk's office.

A Certificate of the City Treasurer showing that all Rates and Taxes of the Candidate have been paid within the time required by law must be attached to each Nomination Paper.

PLEBISCITE

At the same time and place the Electors are requested by resolution of the City Council to express their preference of one of the following methods of selecting a Police Commission:

1. Shall the City Council continue to appoint from among the Aldermen a Police Commission?
2. Shall the Police Commission be elected by a vote of the Citizens in the same manner as the Mayor and Aldermen?

**STRAY TOPICS FROM
OLD NEW YORK**

New York, March 8—The police graft investigations, official and unofficial, continue to bring to light an incredible amount of evidence of the equally incredible corruption of the New York police department. The confessions by Ashley Shea, who had been one of the intermediaries between the men "higher up" in the police department and the gamblers and keepers of disorderly houses, have caused a score of gamblers in Harlem to disappear from the city after closing their establishments. Two ex-mayors of New York, Low and McEllan, appeared as witnesses before the Cullen investigating committee and it appears from their testimony that they had knowledge of the corruption among the city police officials. In view of this it seems strange that Mayor Gaynor managed to remain in blissful ignorance of the rottenness of his police department—as must be inferred from his statements to the press and before the investigating committee. Even now he seems unwilling to admit that there is something radically wrong with the police department. Mudraking is neither a particularly pleasant nor elevating occupation and District Attorney Whitman's job is by no means enviable; but somebody had to do the work and Mr. Whitman has shown by his fearlessness and efficiency that he is the right man for the position.

The annual report for 1912 of the Jewish Agricultural and Industrial Aid Society of this city contains some interesting information which will probably be surprising to a great many persons. It shows that Jewish farmers are fast becoming an important part and factor in the agricultural life of this country. According to the figures of the report there are about 7,500 Jewish farming families, with an aggregate of about 37,000 souls, in the United States. The society has been established to promote farming among Jews and to give financial assistance to Jewish families who wish to become farmers. During the past year the society made loans aggregating \$1,494,437 to 2,266 farmers occupying 1,886 farms. The loans were distributed over twenty-eight States of the Union and several Canadian provinces. The largest number of Jewish farmers with whom the society has had dealings live in New Jersey, Connecticut comes next in numbers, then New York and then North Dakota. The society has also supplied Jewish farm laborers to many farmers in various parts of the country and the men supplied are reported to have given good satisfaction.

Mother-in-law jokes have gone out of fashion, but that does not prove that the relations between son-in-law and mother-in-law are always perfectly harmonious. P. A. Stillwell, a bookkeeper employed at the Waldorf, had been courting a young lady who had several other admirers, for some time. The other day he persuaded her to meet him secretly down town and go with him to the Little Church Around the Corner, where they were married. After the marriage Stillwell communicated with his mother-in-law by telephone and broke the news to her. She expressed herself "delighted," which rather surprised Stillwell as she had been opposed to his aspirations. She asked him to come to her house with his wife and he accepted the invitation. When he arrived at the house later in the afternoon, however, two men, one of whom a rejected suitor for the hand of Mrs. Stillwell, received him in the hall and gave him a terrific beating. Stillwell is still wondering whether his mother-in-law had arranged the little surprise or whether the encounter was accidental.




