their total area annually, they will produce more oysters than were produced in all Canada last year.

Mr. Carter presented a petition in favor of a bill to amend the Act to incorporate the Tobique and Campbellton Railway Company.

Hon. Dr. Landry introduced a bill to prevent the spread of insects, pests and plant diseases destructive to vegetation. He explained that this bill was for the purpose of putting New Brunswick with the other provinces of the Dominion. British Columbia, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and other provinces had acted along the lines of this bill, and there was also Federal legislation of a similar nature. This province has to import large quantities of vegetation, called nursery stock, and this legislation was for the better protection of such stock.

Mr. Hachey presented a petition in favor of a bill relating to the town of Bathurst.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer moved that the bill to consolidate the act respecting rates and taxes be referred back to the Committee of the whole House for reconsideration.

The House went into Committee with Mr. Young in the chair, and agreed to the bill with a slight amendment.

Hon. Mr. Flemming for the Committee to nominate the Standing Committees, presented a report recommending that Mr. Carson of St. John County, and Mr. Stewart of Gloucester, be added to the Committees on Corporations and Agriculture respectively.

Mr. Woods asked for leave of absence for Mr. Guptil until Thursday next.

The House adjourned at 4.30 o'clock.

WOULD NOT BE HEARD

Rev. H. E. Thomas of St. John who was here as a delegate to the convention of the New Brunswick Branch of the Dominion Alliance resigned from the position of member of the committee selected to wait upon the government and present a request for a prohibitory liquor law. Rev. Mr. Thomas was replaced by Secretary MacTavish. His resignation was due to the fact that the statement had been made by Hon. H. F. McLeod that it would be useless to send Rev. J. L. Batty of Moncton, Rev. W. R. Robinson of St. John or Rev. H. B. Thomas of St. John as representatives, as the government would not hear them. The clergymen have made themselves obnoxious to the provincial government by their activity in temperance matters.

GOVT. ASKED TO ENACT

anarchist, the criminal. Why exempt the source and direct cause of all other offences? The saloon directly plunges into public life, defies our laws, forces us to spend millions to care for its by-products and yet there are those who claim that the best way is to regulate it. I say that such a position is morally indefensible and has been condemned by all recent investigations into social vice. In view of the tremendous interests involved and the history of toleration and regulation there is only one position which plants its feet on the bed of rock of ethical and spiritual reality and that is total abstinence for the individual and total prohibition by the state.

Just a word as to method. There is ground for difference of opinion as to whether prohibition can be successfully accomplished in this province at the present time. There is no difference of opinion as to the necessity of a thorough campaign of scientific, moral and spiritual education as a stepping stone to prohibition. I can only suggest lines of advance. First, we must develop the manhood and womanhood of our people, until they feel the full force of personal obligation.

Second, we must develop a stronger spirit of Christian democracy. There must grow up a great, pure, patriotic passion which cares for the needy and weak and which spurns all base consideration to prostitute the ballot for commercial ends. There is enough sentiment now to carry a prohibitory law in most parts but there is not enough pure conviction to stand by its enforcement.

AFTERNOON SESSION

At a business meeting held this afternoon the special committee appointed to consider the question of sending a delegation to appear before the government reported in favor of sending the delegation. The session was occupied largely by a discussion on the question of securing the services of a field secretary and organizer, and of financing the appointment. The executive had had both these referred to it, but was unable to reach any conclusion. Three names were suggested, but no action was taken by the committee.

Mr. W. L. McFarlane moved, seconded by R. B. Wallace, that the appointment of a permanent field secretary and organizer be left with the executive, carried.

On motion of Rev. Dr. Smith the question of raising finances was referred to the executive. Rev. Dr. MacDonald and Rev. Dr. Kierstead were added to the committee to consider this question.

BEFORE THE GOVERNMENT

The committee representing the alliance which appeared before the government at 5 p. m. and asked for a provisional prohibitory law comprised C. N. Vroom, of St. Stephen; C. Fraser, McTavish and J. W. Smith, St. John.

Premier Flemming in reply expressed the sympathy of the government with the cause of temperance and pointed out that already the province had advanced legislation.

There was a provision that any parish in a county under the liquor license law could, by means of a largely signed petition go to the lieutenant governor-in-council and his honor could issue a proclamation discontinuing the issuing of licenses in the parish. There was also a provision whereby a vote on the question could be taken at a municipal election and if the majority of those voting cast their ballots in favor of no license, further licenses would not be issued and another vote on the question could not be taken in that municipality for a number of years.

The premier also pointed out that under these two provisions a large area of the province had adopted no license, and it seemed that the law in its present form provided for the doing away with licenses in the province as rapidly as the people were in favor of doing away with them. He doubted the wisdom of proceeding any faster.

Attention was also called by the delegation to the fact that the present liquor license law contained no provision for the disposal of liquors seized under that act. Quantities of liquor so seized are now at Campbellton, and in Kent County, and there is no available method of disposing of them.

It is understood that during the recess a committee from the Alliance may again wait upon the government.
