### Mount A Lost Close Game To U. N. B.; Score 3 to 2

**SYDNEY WON  
FROM HALIFAX SOCIALS  
IN OVERTIME**

Winning Goal Was Scored on Shot  
Glancing From Twaddle's Skate---  
Big Crowd Saw Game

Halifax, Feb. 25—By the proverbial fluky shot which invariably wins an overtime hockey game the Sydney "Millionaires" took a lucky win from the Halifax Socials tonight, the final score being 4 to 3. Fraser scored Sydney's winning goal on a decided fluke, the puck striking Twaddle's skate and caroming from a sharp angle into the net. It was the crowd of almost 5,000 disappointed people left the building with out much cheering.

In the first period the score ended 3 to 1 in favor of Sydney but the score was tied in the second. No goal was tallied in the third and it took about three minutes of overtime before the fluke shot gave Sydney the game. This puts the Socials out of the championship.

### PHILLIES FLIT TO THE SUNNY SOUTH

Philadelphia, Pa., Feb. 25—With a big bunch of players in his squad, Manager Doolin of the Philadelphia National League team, left today for the spring training camp at Southern Pines, N. C. The Phillies will spend about three weeks at the training grounds. On the way home they will engage in a number of exhibition games, the last of which will be with Baltimore at Baltimore March 30 and 31. The spring series with the Athletics will begin on the home grounds here April 1 and continue to April 8. The next day the Phillies will have the honor of playing the first championship game at Ebbets Field, Brooklyn.

U. N. B. Claims Mt. Allison's Second Goal Was  
Scored Offside and Claim Looks Good--Red and  
Black Shut Visitors Out in First Half--Mount A  
Had Fast Forwards But Were Outplayed in Check-  
ing and Defence

U. N. B. broke the goose-egg in the Intercollegiate Hockey League by beating Mount Allison 3 to 2 at the Arctic Rink last night. It was not first class hockey but had the merit of being interesting right to the final sound of the bell because either team had a chance to win on account of the closeness of the score. The result of the match leaves the Intercollegiate League still to be decided between Acadia and King's College with the latter the favorite on past performances.

U. N. B. got the jump on Mount A. in the first half last night scoring twice in that period and shutting the Sackville college out. In the second half, Mt. Allison had the better of the play and scored twice, but the second goal was on a clear offside and raised a big kick on the part of U. N. B. The Red and Black scored once in this half. The heavy checking by U. N. B. was a noticeable feature of the game and the defense clearly outclassed Mount A.

In centre-ice Bill Godfrey and Clark had something on Lockary and Barry of the U. N. B. but in Machum and Pugh the local college had the better pair of wings. In goal Frank McGibbon showed that he had lots and some to spare. At coverpoint Melanson showed a big improvement and in scoring pulled off the best individual play of the game. Greg Feeney was on at point and played a good steady game.

Godfrey was the big noise of the of the Garnet and Gold team as was expected. He worked hard and was ably assisted by Clark the rover. Continual offside loafing spoiled the work of both players however. Pickard and Crowe the coverpoint and point did not show anything startling and when they resorted to the old-fashioned method of long shots brought the crowd on them. In the net Borden made many good stops but could be easily coaxed out of his goal.

### REFEREE TRITES A LITTLE OFF

"Shorty" Trites of Moncton was the referee and the spectators did not take particularly to his work as he was very lax as far as off-sides were concerned. Mt. Allison took advantage of this all through the game and netted one goal through it.

### GAME WAS CLEAN

The game was clean. But one scrap occurred and that was in the second period when Pugh and Crowe exchanged a few love taps and went to the fence for five minutes for the offense. Machum was laid out for a short time toward the close of the game but was able to continue after a short rest. The play was fast in the first half but slowed in the second as the pace began to tell. Mt. Allison has a forward line composed of fast skaters and good stick-handlers. In handling the puck Lockary was weak but otherwise played an aggressive game. Barry was able to break through the Mt. Allison line about when he felt like it. Taken all round the game compared very favorably with others played here this season.

### FIRST HALF.

The first half saw U. N. B. with a big margin over Mount A. although the visitors rushed things at first. The Red and Black defence worked well and the play soon went to the other end. Pugh notched the first goal for U. N. B. on a pass from Machum when the forward line tried a combined rush.

### MONCTON BEAT NEW GLASGOW IN VERY ROUGH GAME

Chance Now For Three-cornered Tie  
in M. P. H. A.—Many Scraps  
and Heavy Penalizing

Moncton, Feb. 25—Two thousand spectators tonight saw the Moncton Vics defeat the New Glasgow Cubs by the score of seven to five, in one of the fastest games played in the M. P. H. A. league here this season.

Tonight's game meant much to both teams. If Moncton lost she had no chance of winning the league, while defeat for New Glasgow meant the best they could hope for was a tie with Sydney, providing the latter dropped the two remaining games with the Cubs and Vics. As Moncton won she has now to defeat Sydney at Sydney and New Glasgow has to defeat Sydney at New Glasgow to leave these three teams a tie. As the league now stands, Sydney leads by two games over Moncton and New Glasgow.

Tonight's game was rough, both teams being determined to win. There were many sensational runs and plenty of fast work but the checking was rough and the spectacle of players slashing at each other's heads with sticks was seen on one or two occasions. In the last period Lyle and Doran, who had been roughing it considerably, got into a fist encounter with the result both men were put off the ice for the rest of the game. When the game finished New Glasgow had two men on the boards and Moncton one.

Wilkie scored the first goal for New Glasgow in seven and a half minutes and a half minute later Carpenter evened up. At the end of the first period the score stood three to one in favor of the Vics. In the second inning Moncton scored three goals and New Glasgow one. In the third period the Cubs braced and for a time it looked as if they would tie the score. Three goals were notched up, leaving the score five to six against them. Then the Vics, with two New Glasgow men off the ice, got another goal and here the scoring ended.

Harry Scott, who has been suspended for the rest of the season by the executive, practised with the Vics and was in readiness to go on if called upon. New Glasgow had two spares and both were used in the periods. Moncton's one spare was also utilized. J. H. Brown and C. Weisner handled the game.
