other on a fly. Fredericton scored
four runs in the seventh inning and
won the game. To Frank Keaney
falls the real honor of winning, for
with St. John leading 4 to 2 he
drove out a home-run that broke up
the game. The winning run was scored
by Pat Duggan on a hit by Stone.

UMPIREICAL TROUBLES.

There were bunches of trouble about
the umpiring. No official umpire was
on hand and Sandy Staples was
pressed into service. He lasted about
four innings and quite after that
baited by both teams. O'Brien, St.
John's "beautiful doll," was the di-
rect cause of the trouble, cutting
third-base in the fourth inning.
Staples did not see it and the run
counted. It was when Fredericton
put up a big kick on this that Stap-
les quit. O'Brien had previously had
trouble with the umpire and had
more with Ed Phelan of the Freder-
icton team, who, with Ramsey of St.
John, went in to umpire the balance
of the game. In the seventh Ramsey
had to get into the game. Pinkerton,
whom he replaced on account of in-
juries, umpired in his stead.

ST. JOHN'S ONE INNING.

St. John filled the bases in the
third inning but Morey struck out
Shankey and York and Pease fouled
out to Murphy. In the fourth the
Greeks had their big inning, scoring
all their runs. Eten began things
with a single. Flaherty was passed.
Waterhouse was safe on an error by
Morey. Riley brought a run in with
a sacrifice fly. Pinkerton hit safely
and Flaherty scored. O'Brien hit and

other error by Morey but was thrown
out by Murphy, trying to steal sec-
ond.

FREDERICTON'S BIG INNING.

The "lucky seventh" was Freder-
icton's big inning. The first run was
scored in the fourth by Duggan. "P.
J." hit safely and when Riley dropped
Conley's fly, took a big chance
and finished the circuit from first base.
In the fourth "Hank" Callahan was
safe on Pinkerton's error and stole
second. Dave Morey hit to centre-
field and "Hank" came home. Morey
was caught on a poor attempt to
steal second. Keaney then came to
bat and immortalized himself by hit-
ting four four bases. This put the
crowd right on its hind legs and
yelling. Bob Ganley put a long one
out to Pease. That usually sterling
fielder juggled and dropped the ball.
He followed the performance with a
wild heave over second base into the
crowd and Bob went to third. He
scored on a hit by Duggan tying up
the score. Harry Stone then came
along with a single and Pat made
the tally 5 to 4. Stone stole second
and it looked like more runs but
Bob Conley died out to Riley.
