Dr. and Mrs. Bailey held a reception which was attended by some sixty or seventy guests. The occasion was marked also by the presentation of a number of gifts to the much esteemed couple who are observing their golden wedding. Telegrams and letters of congratulation were forwarded to Dr. and Mrs. Bailey in large numbers. A telegram from the chief justice, Sir Frederic Barker and his wife were among the number.

A large number of the descendants of Dr. and Mrs. Bailey in the second and third generations were present at their home last night where the reception was held. Their children who were present were Mr. L. W. Bailey Jr., Mrs. H. E. West and Miss Laureline Bailey of this city, Mr. Joseph Bailey of Boston, and Dr. George W. Bailey of Fredericton Junction.

Dr. and Mrs. Bailey were married August 19, 1863. Previous to her marriage Mrs. Bailey was Miss Laureline Marie d'Avray, daughter of Joseph Marshal, Baron d'Avray of Versailles, France. Dr. Bailey is emeritus professor of Geology and Natural History of the University of New Brunswick, having retired from the faculty of that institution in 1907, after forty-six years of service. UNEXPECTED

SLUMP IN TAX-

PAYMENTS OCCURS

Receipts at Office of City Treasurer
Not up to the Record of Former
Years—Financial Stringency
Is Being Felt

The period during which the discount of five per cent. is allowed on city taxes expires tomorrow, August 21, and the prospect is that there will be a serious falling off in receipts at the City Treasurer's Office. This is contrary to expectation as last week there was quite a rush of money into the Treasurer's Office. This week however, there has been a marked falling off and receipts are much below the amount usually reached at this time. The financial stringency is assigned as the cause of the falling off, many who under ordinary circumstances have taken advantage of the discount period, are not doing so this year.

The office of the City Treasurer will be kept open tonight and also Thursday night in order to accommodate any citizens who may desire to pay their taxes at that time.
