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THE TORIES AND THE SENATE

The Acadia Recorder says that the batch of senators appointed by Mr. Borden since 1911 are by no means ready to be abolished. It adds:

"The senate cannot be reformed, deformed, maimed, gagged or throttled by Canadian legislation. Neither is there the slightest chance of the imperial parliament amending the North America Act without first being assured of a consensus of opinion in Canada. Our Tory friends are merely excited. They are sore, distressed, disappointed and in bitterness of soul they 'rage and imagine a vain thing.' Too many of Mr. Borden's hard worked and overburdened friends, followers, parasites and hangers on are now enjoying or looking forward to enjoying the 'chimney neck of ease' in the Upper Chamber, to permit of that institution being interfered with to any serious extent. The 'heroes triumphant' will not do so and the 'heroes expectant' will not destroy their Valhalla beforehand. It is all amusing nothing more."

The announcement now comes from Ottawa that Premier Borden is not to re-introduce the naval bill next session but will wait until such time as its passage through the senate will be ensured. In other words the Tories are going to wait until Providence reforms the senate for them.

St. John Telegraph—The government railway system now comprises the old Canada Eastern, and it is to control the Valley Railroad also, and, instead of enjoying the old Intercolonial rates, people living along the Valley Railway will find themselves facing the new Intercolonial tariff, whereas they were virtually promised the I. C. R. rates which were in force when the Valley Railroad legislation was enacted. Doubtless it is possible to give reasons of a sort for the recent increases, but it seems highly improbable that the Minister of Railways or his representatives can give reasons which the public will find convincing, always remembering that the Intercolonial is not supposed to pay any dividends, and that it best serves the public if it can pay its way and still furnish reasonably cheap transportation.

Halifax Echo—Canadian imports of cotton goods have more than trebled in the last twelve years and they have about quadrupled in the last fifteen years. During the period from 1900 to 1912 the total imports of cotton increased by 231 per cent., while English cottons increased by 209.19 per cent., American by 252.58 per cent. and those from other countries by 363.67 per cent. The latter figure, however, is larger than it should actually be, as embroidery and lace were formerly stated separately from the cotton schedule, but now white and cream-colored cotton embroideries are included under that schedule.

It used to be said that Mr. Alexander Gibson made a mistake when he erected and equipped a cotton mill at Marysville at a cost of nearly a million dollars. It is quite true that the mill when it was the property of Mr. Gibson was not a money making enterprise for its owner but it gave employment to a large number of people and assisted in building up the town of Marysville. Today the lumber mills at Marysville are silent but the cotton mill continues to be the greatest hive of industry in Central New Brunswick. A grave yard would be a busy place in comparison with Marysville today if it were not for the cotton mill which the brains and money of Alexander Gibson established many years ago.

Lethbridge News—Our good Methodist friends are again talking church union in conference and it is figured that a settled policy will have been reached by next year. That is encouraging, particularly here in the west, where denominational enterprise it in many places proving decidedly costly and without much corresponding good effect.

Moncton Transcript—Mr. Gutelius gets \$20,000 a year salary. The minimum freight rate on the I. C. R. is increased from 25c. to 35c., an increase of 10c. It therefore requires an increase of forty per cent. on the minimum freight rate on two thousand and minimum shipments to pay Mr. Gutelius' salary. But then Mr. Brady's salary has also been increased several thousand dollars per annum. This was done so that the Borden government could practically express its contempt for the Tory bosses here, who pledged themselves to obtain Mr. Brady's removal to another field. The local Tories here have no influence.

The news of the sudden death of Mr. David C. Burpee, the well known contractor of Gibson, came as a painful shock to the community. By his death a most worthy man and an excellent citizen is lost to the village of Gibson and County of York. His business career was a long and honorable one; he provided a great deal of employment for labor and rendered good service to his native province in more ways than one. To the members of the bereaved family who are so suddenly called upon to mourn the loss of a devoted husband and father, The Mail extends its most sincere sympathy.

Edmonton Bulletin—Sir George Ross is an imperialist whose imperialism is not open to anybody's questioning. His deliverance, as leader of the Liberals in the senate, on the question of Canada's duty in the matter of naval defence should be a timely and effective offset to the foolishly partisan attempts that have been made to insinuate against the Liberal party and against Sir Wilfrid Laurier a want of concern in imperial affairs and a lack of willingness to assume Canada's proper share of the burden of defending British interests at sea.

There being no painters in New Brunswick capable of doing the work the Flemming government has entered into a thirty thousand dollar contract with an Ottawa concern to paint the steel bridges of the province. The Flemming government is strong on providing ready made farms for immigrants, but it does not think that the native sons of New Brunswick are worthy of much consideration.

The session of Parliament just ended was the most strenuous since Confederation and would you believe it Mr. O. S. Crockett only made one speech and only once during the session did his picture appear in the local hack organ. The Montreal Star also published his picture on the strength of a rumor that he was to succeed Sir Frederic Barker as Chief Justice. The joke on that occasion was certainly on the Star.

Ottawa Citizen—A Conservative contemporary suggests that, as the British parliament is now in session, it will be very easy to put through whatever amendment is necessary to curb the power of the senate. It must credit the British parliament with iron nerves if it expects that body would take any action that would enable Great Britain to secure Canada's contribution.

The name of Rudyard Kipling is being mentioned for the post of Poet Laureate of Great Britain, but the fact that he got in bad with the Royal Family when he wrote "The Widow of Windsor" is likely to militate against his chances of being chosen.

Thirty-six men from Rochester and Buffalo, N.Y., have gone to Seattle on a twelve thousand acre tract in the San Simon Valley, Arizona, which they will farm on a co-operative community basis. They plan to build a model town with public buildings grouped about a plaza.

Sackville Tribune—Gutelius gets \$20,000 per year for managing the people's railway. In order to raise this amount the freight rates, which come home to everyone, have had to be increased. That's right, grind the poor man down "soak it to him," he has no friends.

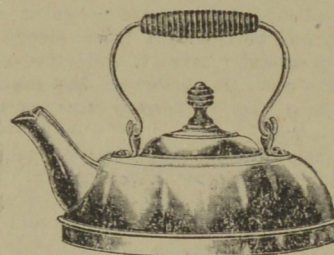
