 operation with those of the other denominations."

Another discussion arose at this point as to whether the speakers from the different sides should alternately take part in the discussion. Dr. Gordon of Winnipeg, said that he ventured to say that they should not recognize two parties in the church, and that every man should have an equal chance to make a statement, which was received with applause.

Principal Murray had the floor at this time but Dr. Campbell made his way to the centre of the platform and started to speak. The moderator said that Principal Murray had the floor but Principal Murray gave way to Dr. Campbell.

DR. CAMPBELL.

Dr. Campbell made a notable contribution to the discussion.

"It was indeed surprising," he said, "that so many ministers and elders voted in favor of the substitution of the doctrinal part of the basis of union for the confession of faith, so there is wanting in it the Virile-Pauline doctrine of predestination. That there is in it no reference to the covenant made with Adam, and that particular election and particular redemption are not embraced in it. There is an absence of the outstanding truth of effectual calling and its doctrinal corollary of perseverance, which have so largely entered into the domestic instruction of Presbyterians for centuries, which were calculated to confirm spiritual dignity upon those accepting them, and which, it may be historically claimed, imparted fibre to Presbyterians and begot in them a deep sense of moral responsibility.

"The high doctrines of 'free will and fate' which Scottish artisans have been wont to discuss when they met at the street corners had not a little to do with shaping Scottish life and character.

"The 'basis' does not give that prominence to the sovereignty of God, His sovereign love, as included in his purpose which characterizes the confession. The Scottish reformers following the Apostle Paul, the great expounder of Christ, replaced God on the throne of the universe from which he had been pulled down, in the sub-consciousness of Romanists, by the claims of the priest to be able to create him in the mass.

"Our system makes much of God and little of man, except insofar as he is the object of divine compassion and the subject of saving grace, having for its proper fruit spiritual humility."

Principal Murray of Saskatoon, went into the statistics of the vote which had been taken upon church union and in comparisons between the vote cast at the last general election of the Dominion, contended that the vote taken by the church was much more reliable as showing the attitude of the church than the Conservative vote reflected the opinion of Canada at that election. The opportunity presented the church today was such as had never been presented before in consummating union.

The debate will be continued tomorrow.

A WORTHY CITIZEN.

Mr. Burpee was a man of kindly and generous disposition and enjoyed the respect of all who knew him. His business dealings were characterized by the strictest honesty and his word was as good as his bond. In politics he was a staunch Liberal and was never afraid to say so. For some years he had been a member of Court St. Mary's, I.O.F.

The deceased was twice married and is survived by a widow, formerly Miss Larlee of Tobique, and a family of three sons and two daughters. They are Lockwood Burpee of Toronto, Bruce Burpee of Golden, B. C.; Mrs. Pond of Cobalt, Miss Bessie Burpee and Ray Burpee at home, the latter being by his second wife. He is also survived by one brother, Thomas Burpee of St. John, and one sister, Mrs. J. E. Simmons of Ottawa. The hour of the funeral has not yet been announced but it will probably be held on Thursday.

While Mr. James Montieth of St. Mary's was driving down river yesterday afternoon in the vicinity of the Victoria Mill, his horse became frightened at an approaching auto, and shied, climbing on a pile of logs at the roadside throwing Mr. Montieth from the carriage. He was badly shaken up, and is feeling the effects of the accident today. Mr. Montieth claims that the car was occupying at least two-thirds of the road and that he had no room to pass. There have been complaints by drivers of horses that many autoists when the roads are rough, which is most of the time, will not turn out sufficiently to give passing vehicles room throwing the burden of turning out upon drivers of horses.

DR. WINSLOW, CRIMINAL EXPERT, DEAD

London, June 8—Doctor Forbes L. Winslow, the specialist connected during the last thirty-five years with some of the most famous criminal cases, where the question of sanity had arisen, died this morning of heart failure. He was a lineal descendant of Edward Winslow, the first governor of New Plymouth, and one of the leaders of the Pilgrim fathers who sailed on the Mayflower in 1670.

Dr. Winslow interested himself in the case of Mrs. Maybrick, and when in New York was thanked publicly for his efforts in her behalf. He was the first English expert to give evidence in American courts on the question of lunacy. In his earlier days Winslow was an excellent cricketer. He was invited to be the captain of the first English team of cricketers visiting Canada and the United States, but business prevented his acceptance. Dr. Winslow was the author of many books on lunacy and madness, and of innumerable articles for medical journals. He was the founder of the British Hospital for Mental Disorders in London, Eng., and honorary physician of benevolent organizations, including the Cab-drivers' Benevolent Association and the Unit-
