Bangor Here For First Local Game With Pets

ENGLISH AND
UNITED STATES POLO
TEAMS PLAY TODAY

First Match For International Trophy
at Meadowbrook Field--Both
Teams are Strong

New York, June 10—The international polo cup series began this afternoon at the grounds of the fashionable Meadowbrook Hunt Club at Westbury, L. I., some twenty miles from this city, and during the remainder of this week the results of the matches between the champion American quartet and the English challengers will be awaited eagerly throughout the entire world, wherever polo is played.

The American team, which regained the famous trophy from the Britishers in 1909 and successfully defended it in the matches two years later, is made up of such veterans of the game as L. E. Stoddard, Devereux Milburn, Foxhall Keene and Malcolm Stevenson.

This year's challenging squad is composed of Captain Leslie St. George Cheape, Captain Vivian Lockett, Captain Noel Edwards and Captain R. G. Ritson, with Lord Wodehouse and Captain F. M. Freahe as reserve players. For the past four weeks the Englishmen have been in this country undergoing final preparations for themselves and their ponies. The team has had a number of practice matches, and their play has been widely commented upon.

Interest in the international matches is intense wherever polo is played in this country, and the Meadowbrook Club has erected stands capable of seating 40,000 spectators. Clubmen and social leaders from Philadelphia, Newport, Boston, Washington, Narragansett Pier, Chicago and San Francisco were on hand for the opening of the matches today. That the international contests have stirred up the patriotic feelings of the ordinary sport-loving individual as well as of the polo enthusiast is evidenced by the fact that accommodations were reserved by the club for thousands of general admissions at 50 cents per head. The private boxes however, have sold for from \$50 to \$150 for the entire series.

Polo is a very ancient game. It is not English, as many people think. It is supposed to be of Hindu origin. The game was first suggested to British officers in India by the Muni-porees and was introduced into England in 1870. Six years later James Gordon Bennett introduced the game into America and it has become one of the chief delights of wealthy men throughout the world.

The first of the international matches took place at Newport in 1886, when the Hurlingham team, captained by John Watson, won the cup. The gift of the Westchester Polo Club, was taken over to England, where it remained until July 5, 1909. America's first challenge for the cup was given in 1900 by a team captained by Foxhall Keene. The Americans were unsuccessful. In 1902 the Americans made another unsuccessful attempt to regain the trophy.

But in 1909, twenty-three years after the cup had been taken to Hurlingham, a Meadowbrook team, challenging with the consent of the Polo Association, brought back the trophy. The team was composed of Harry Payne Whitney, Lawrence Waterbury, J. M. Waterbury and Devereux Milburn. In 1911 the same "Big Four"

New York, June 7—There is a strong dramatic element which would undoubtedly appeal to a French playwright in the circumstances surrounding the death a few days ago of Patrick Considine, a simple village policeman in Chiffside one of the suburban places on the Jersey side of the Hudson. About the facts which led to the shooting of the policeman nothing definite is known and the truth will probably never become known which would give the widest scope to the imagination of a playwright in building up the preliminary plot leading up to the critical point. It seems that Considine, a strapping big fellow more than six feet tall and proportionately developed, on the fatal night visited his neighbor, Mrs. Devlin, a vaudeville actress married to a little insignificant shrimp of an actor named James Devlin. When Devlin came home that night and found Considine with Mrs. Devlin he became furious, presuming that everything was not as it should be between his wife and Considine. He ranted in the melodramatic fashion but wisely refrained from attacking the unwelcome visitor, for whose herculean strength he was no match. He acted the role of the outraged husband and incidentally asserted that he would shoot Considine if he had a gun.

The big policeman being Irish and evidently filled with a thoroughly unmodern spirit of chivalry, obligingly pulled his own revolver out of his pocket and with the words, "All right, if that is the way you feel about it, my lad here's my gun. Take a shot." He handed the weapon to Devlin, who without hesitating shot Considine down. The big policeman was mortally wounded and died a few days later at the hospital. Devlin is now in jail awaiting the action of the authorities.
