## QUEBEC DENTIST

### WAS PUT OFF TRAIN

Quebec, July 9—Dr. A. Langlois, a well known dentist has taken action for \$10,000 damages against the Quebec and Lake St. John Railway, owned and managed by the Canadian Railway Company.

A few days ago, Dr. Langlois travelling on one of the trains of the company refused to pay his fare because he had no seat. The conductor stopped the train at once and expelled him by force from the train.

About a dozen friends of Dr. Langlois being on the train and also

without seats refused to give up their tickets but they were not submitted to the same expulsion. Therefore, Dr. Langlois sues the company on the ground that he was submitted to an unfair, unjust and illegal expulsion.

# HON. SENATOR ELLIS HAS JOINED GREAT MAJORITY

St. John, July 10—Widespread sadness and regret will be caused to the people of St. John when they hear of the death of Senator J. V. Ellis, who passed away a little after half past twelve o'clock today. For several weeks Senator Ellis had been very ill and this morning about eleven o'clock there was a decided change for the worse. The members of the family were quickly called to his bedside; for about an hour and a half the Senator lingered gradually growing weaker and then quietly passed away.

During all the time of his illness, although very weak, Senator Ellis had retained all his usual clearness of mind and had been able to converse clearly with friends who came to see him.

All the members of the family have been with their father except his son John, who is at present in Washington but was unable to make the trip East when he heard of his father's illness. Joseph Ellis came from Vancouver a week ago. No arrangements as yet have been made with regard to the funeral.

Senator Ellis was taken ill before leaving Ottawa after the close of the session and was confined to his room in the Russell hotel there. He made the trip to St. John very comfortably, but did not rally sufficiently to leave the house since that time.

The fatal illness made steady inroads upon his strength, and it was realized several days ago that he could not recover. His son, Joseph N. Ellis of Vancouver, has been in the city for more than a week. Dr. W. L. Ellis, another son, attended him during his late illness.

Senator Ellis was a prominent Mason and an Oddfellow. He was postmaster of St. John for several years.

## HIS FAMILY

He leaves to mourn his wife, who was Mary Caroline, eldest daughter of the late Samuel Babbitt, Fredericton; two daughters, five sons, and also fourteen grandchildren and a great-grandchild. The sons are Frank B., of The Globe Publishing Co., Ltd.; George D., of this city, traveler for the Ogilvie Flour Mills Co.; Dr. W. L., of West St. John; J. V. Jr., of Yhalma, Washington, and Joseph N., a barrister in Vancouver, B. C.; and the daughters, Mrs. H. Lawrence and Mrs. E. R. Taylor, both of this city. Messrs. George N. and D. Lee Babbitt of Fredericton are brothers of Mrs. Ellis.

Hon. John Valentine Ellis was of Irish origin, a son of Michael Ellis and his wife Margaret Walsh Ellis, being born at Halifax, Feb. 14, 1835. He was educated at Halifax and learned the printing business early in life, coming to St. John by 1857 and beginning his newspaper career here as a reporter, serving five years in this capacity. In partnership with another gentleman he then purchased the Globe and since that time has been its editor and conductor, completing fifty years of service in the editorial chair in December, 1911, at which time a most elaborate and complete anniversary number was issued in commemoration of the event.

## POLITICAL CAREER

He first entered politics as a Liberal member for St. John in the provincial house in 1882, and sat for five years. He was then elected to the House of Commons and represented St. John at Ottawa from 1887 to 1891 and from 1896 to 1900. He also served for a time as postmaster of St. John. He was called to the Senate Sept. 3, 1900. He has served as chairman of the debates committee of the senate, and also was sent as a delegate to the United States in the arrangement of various international matters.

One of the incidents of his public career which probably contributed greatly to his popularity was the harsh treatment meted out to him when he was convicted for contempt of court arising from a political case, his fine after a short term of imprisonment being paid by public subscription. His name was frequently mentioned for the Lieutenant-governorship of the province. In June, 1907 he, with Mrs. Ellis, was specially invited to King Edward's garden party at Windsor Castle, and was also presented to the King and Queen the same year.

He found time in the midst of busy political and editorial duties to write several brochures, at one time coming out in favor of annexation to the United States and favoring complete reciprocity to the last. He was a warm advocate of maritime confederation.

## HIS WORK FOR CITY

Besides his work for St. John in the wider field of politics, Mr. Ellis was always a good citizen and gave good service as a school trustee, as a director of the N. B. Historical Society, president of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty, president of the Natural History Society of N. B., and was also president of the Keystone Fire Insurance Company, and a director of the St. John Relief and Aid Society. He was the donor of the medal given for the best standing in English to students of the High school.

Hon. Mr. Ellis was a prominent fraternalist, having been prominent in both Masonic and Oddfellow lodges. He held the office of grand master, the highest in the gift of the Masonic order in New Brunswick, and was also P. G. H. priest of the Grand Chapter of New Brunswick, past commander-in-chief of the Sovereign Great Priory of Canada, past commander-in-chief of the Supreme Council Scottish Rite for Canada, and provincial grand master of the Royal Order of Scotland.
