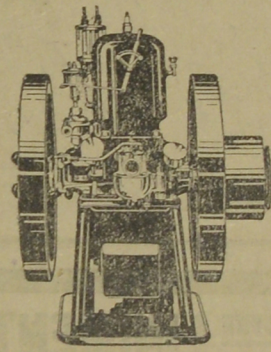

## RODEY LOOKS LIKE "BIG MONEY" WINNER OF GRAND CIRCUIT

Won \$5,000 Ohio Stake at Cleveland Thursday—"Pop" Geers Captured Pacing Sweepstakes

Cleveland, July 10—A. S. Rodney, of Jersey City, bids fair to become the big money-winning driver of the opening Grand Circuit meeting, as he won the \$5,000 Ohio stake today after winning the \$2,000 Fasig yesterday. With apparent ease, Marigold, Rodney driving, carried off the opening stake in today's big event in straight heats.

The veteran "Pop" Geers, who, until today has not won a heat, took first in the championship pacing sweepstakes and the 2.15 trot. Stethbrino Lad, a strong favorite in the 2.14 pace, repaid the confidence of his supporters by taking the event in straight heats. The real contest was between Ellsworth R and Isaac B, as Rodney seemed to be able to land Stethbrino Lad in front with ease. In the third heat Murphy nosed out Isaac B, with Strathstorn and captured fourth money.

The biggest field that has faced the starter so far, scored for the five thousand dollar stake for 2.10 trotters. In a driving finish Al Murphy sent Marigold across a winner two lengths ahead of Tommy Horn, the favorite. The third and fourth were repetitions.

He was signed several weeks ago. Kavanagh and other Federals with whom the majors have been "firting" must remain with the new league until their contracts expire and they become free agents. This action was taken by the commission despite the protest of the American Association and Three I. League that their players were being approached by Federal agents.

## CINCINNATI REDS GIVE FOUR THOUSAND FOR FRANK HARRINGTON

Ex-Fredericton Twirler Booked For the Big League Next Year—Now With Lynn

Lynn, Mass., July 10—Pat Flaherty the manager of the Lynn team, today sold Pitcher Frank Harrington of his team to the Cincinnati Reds for the sum of \$4,000, which is the biggest sum of money that Lynn has drawn for a player since Elmer Steele was sold.

Harrington is of the famous Harrington family of Wakefield. His brothers Joe and Billy are pitchers, and all three have pitched for the Wakefield High School team.

This is Frank's first year in organized ball and he has done remarkably well since joining the Lynn team. His pitching has been so good that Joe Tinker of the Reds sent scout Tom O'Hara to look him over. O'Hara for the past three weeks has been following the Lynn team around keeping a sharp watch on Harrington, and after careful consideration decided to take the Young Lynn spit ball pitcher.

Herrington is a right hand s'finger weight 180 pounds and stands 5 feet 10½ inches in height.

He will join the Reds at the close of the New England league season.
