AMERICAN PEACE CONGRESS

great mass meeting to be held Saturday night the speakers will include Secretary of State William J. Bryan and Mrs. Percy V. Pennybacker, president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs. Other of the evening sessions will be addressed by Charles M. Fairbanks, former Vice President of the United States, and Booker T. Washington, of Tuskegee Institute.

The general session tomorrow morning will be devoted to a consideration of "The Problems of The Hague Conference." James Brown Scott, secretary of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, will be the presiding officer. The leading speakers and their topics will be: "The Active Promotion of International Peace as a Primary Policy of the United States," Prof. Paul S. Reinsch of the University of Wisconsin; "The Hague Tribunal, Its Present Meaning and Future Promise," Prof. William I. Hull, of Swarthmore College, and "The Teutonic Pledge of Peace," Edwin D. Mead, director of the World Peace Foundation.

Former Vice President Fairbanks will preside at the general session tomorrow night, when the principal speakers will be Dean Shaillet Matthews of the University of Chicago and Dr. P. P. Claxton, United States commissioner of education.

One of the most interesting sessions of Saturday morning, when eminent members of the congress will be that representatives of the United States and Canada will meet to discuss plans for the celebration in 1914-15 of the 100th anniversary of peace among English-speaking peoples. The Canadian speakers will include Justice B. Russell of Halifax, Justice William R. Riddell of the Supreme Court of Ontario and John Lewis, editor of the Toronto Star. The sectional meetings to be held Saturday afternoon will be devoted to the discussion of "Scientists and International Peace," "International Peace Through International Law," and "The Relations of Business and International Peace."

AN OUTSIDE OPINION

St. John Times—Readers of the Fredericton Gleaner are somewhat surprised to observe the attitude of that journal toward Mr. J. W. McCready, who is the city clerk at Fredericton. The Gleaner on Saturday devoted nearly a column to an editorial article protesting against an increase in the salary of the city clerk to \$1,200 per year. **THE FRANCO-GERMAN
ARMAMENT RACE**

(Manchester Guardian.)

No useful purpose would be served by attempting to apportion the blame between France and Germany for the prospective increase of armaments. They do not stand alone. Every nation in Europe is wasting its substance. What makes the case of France particularly touching is the magnitude of the sacrifices that she is prepared to make it a perfectly hopeless struggle with natural laws. The adding of an extra year on the term of military service mean an additional tax of say £50 on every family that has a son of military age. It is the value of 250,000 men put as an additional tax on the industry of France. And all in the hope of proving that two is equal to three. It cannot be done. A nation with a population of 38,000,000 cannot have a standing army equal to that raised by a nation of 67,000,000 except at a wholly disproportionate sacrifice. Germany has only to make an equal effort and France would have to raise the term of barrack life to four and five years.

It is saddening to see a nation with the genius of France running its head against a wall in this way. Two courses are open to France. She may make up for her numerical weakness—which every year will make more marked—by extending her alliances, so as to make a counterpoise to the Powers that she fears most. This is M. Delcasse's way, and as her allies will wish her to have as powerful an army as possible it will be attended by constantly increasing sacrifices on her part.

The other way is to recognize that a nation numerically weaker cannot meet a stronger nation on its own terms, and that it must make up for its natural weakness by some radical change of military policy. Such a change would be the frank abandonment of the military offensive, the restriction of her armaments to the requirements of defence and a new orientation of policy corresponding to this change in her strategy. This is the way that Mr. Juarez has suggested. Can there be any doubt which way a sincere well-wisher of France, with no interests of her own to serve, would wish her to follow?

**SHAKEUP LIKELY
IN BORDEN CABINET**

Montreal, April 29—Le Devoir, the newspaper owned and edited by Henri Bourassa, Nationalist leader, and which is usually well informed on political affairs, states that Hon. Bruno Nantel, minister of inland revenue, Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of railways, and Hon. Dr. Roche, minister of the interior, will resign their portfolios in the Borden cabinet to assume other "important positions." Le Devoir says that Mr. Nantel will become a judge. None of these resignations will take place until the end of the session.

L. T. Marchal of Montreal, may succeed Mr. Nantel in the inland revenue department.

Le Devoir asserts that though Mr. Cochrane has administered his department well, he is not popular in the House or among the Conservative members from the countries through which the Intercolonial railway passes and says he will be sent to Washington as the agent of the Canadian government. He is likely to be succeeded by Major Currie, member for Simcoe, Ont.

Mr. Roche will resign because of ill health and will be sent to the senate, says Le Devoir. His successor may be Arthur Meighen, member for Portage la Prairie. Albert Seigny of Dorchester, aspires to the position of solicitor general, a position also being sought by A. C. Boyce of Algoma. Mr. Borden has not decided on an appointee to this office. The prime minister also would like to secure W. J. Hanna of the Ontario government, but is opposed in this by Sir James Whitney.

**SEEK HEIRS OF
MAN NOW DEAD**

Niagara Falls, Ont., April 27—A tragedy, long ago forgotten, is revived through inquiry being made here today for the heirs of Henry Bruce, who, many years ago, lived in the Town of Lewiston, near here. The tragedy was perpetrated in the village during the strenuous times in this section incidental to the war of 1812-14.

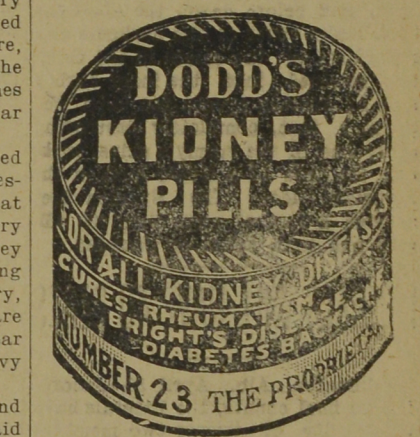
