MISS MORGAN - York St.**SIR CHARLES TUPPER SPEAKS AT AMHERST**

Amherst, N.S., April 29—A meeting of the members of the Amherst Canadian Club took place here this evening in the Hotel St. Regis, C. A. Lusby in the chair.

Judge Wallace of Halifax was the guest of the evening and spoke on Darcy McGee and Confederation. He spoke of the prominent part that McGee played in the struggle for confederation and emphasized the fact that at the time of the Fenian invasion Darcy McGee raised a few companies of volunteers in Montreal for the defence of Canada.

The meeting was attended by Sir Charles Tupper, the sole survivor of the fathers of confederation, and who was an intimate friend and co-operator of Darcy McGee. After a vote of thanks was extended to Judge Wallace for his address "Cumberland's Old War Horse" spoke briefly He said that contrary to the advice of his medical friends he had come to this meeting of the Canadian club to pay his tribute to the life of one of Canada's greatest orators and one of Canada's most patriotic statesmen. He then took up the question of the formation of the first cabinet at the time of confederation. He alluded to the fact that Sir John A. Macdonald had almost given the task up as hopeless when he, himself and Darcy McGee had allowed a compromise to be made between the conflicting interests in Quebec and Ontario. Sir Charles related very many interesting facts in regard to the life and work of this patriotic Irishman who had made Canada his adopted home. He told of his visit to Halifax in 1863 and the splendid address delivered in the temperance hall in favor of federal union and Sir Charles mentioned that on the very morning that McGee was assassinated on the doorstep of his own residence that he (McGee) had just returned from the house of commons where he had just made an eloquent appeal in which he urged fair treatment to Nova Scotia and defended Dr. Tupper as a delegate to England in the interests of federal affairs. A vote of thanks was tendered to Sir Charles Tupper at the end of his most interesting address. The aged statesman will leave tomorrow for St. John and from that city will sail on May 1 for Great Britain.

BIG INCREASE IN IMMIGRATION

Immigration added to the population of Canada during the past fiscal year the equivalent of the whole population of New Brunswick, with fifty thousand souls to spare to make another city the size of St. John or London, Ont. The total influx of new citizens for the twelve months was 402,432—greater by fourteen per cent. than the previous high record of 1911-1912. Of the newcomers, 150,542 were British, an increase of nine per cent. over the preceding twelve months; 139,000 came from the United States, an increase of four per cent., and 112,881 came from other countries, an increase of thirty-seven per cent. For every twenty of the population of Canada, one newcomer was absorbed—a rate of absorption which has been steadily maintained for the past four years.

For the present fiscal year the outlook is for the maintenance of the same steady rate of growth in the influx of new citizens from older and less fortunate lands. The Immigration Department expects the total for the current year to pass the 450,000 mark, although the present financial stringency, felt especially in western Canada, is checking somewhat the influx of farmers from the western American States. At present the tide of new settlers is rolling in at the Atlantic portals at a rate of considerably over one thousand per day. The new Austro-Canadian service, operated by the C. P. R., is bringing tens of thousands of hardy and industrious newcomers from central and eastern Europe. They are finding ready employment as railway navvies in the west, where contractors are eagerly snapping up men.

Toronto, April 29—The opening session of the committee on privileges and election to investigate the corruption charges Hon. W. J. Hanna and Sir James Whitney, was held in the reception room at the parliament buildings this morning.

S. A. Armstrong was asked if he had the papers in connection with the original contact with Taylor, Scott & Co., and the government. Mr. Armstrong said the paper could not be found and a number of other papers were also missing. They had been handed over to Mr. Stewart, counsel for the government, at the time of the dispute with the company. Mr. Stewart ran over a long list of letters, all of which the witness said were missing.



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
