JOINT PRESENTATION BY HIBERNIANS AND C. M. B. A.

Pev. Father Howland Given Purse of One Hundred Dollars by A. O. H. and Travelling Bag and Pipes by Mutual Benefit Association Catholic

Rev. Miles Howland was honored last night by a double presentation on the part of No. 1 Division, Ancient Order of Hibernians, and the Catholic Mutual Benevolent Association. Both organizations presented addresses in which regret was expressed that Rev. Father Howland was to leave Fredericton in the near future and also the esteem in which he was held by the societies mentioned. The reverend gentleman who leaves shortly having been transferred to the Cathedral at St. John made suitable replies to the addresses.

Accompanying the address from the C.M.B.A. was a handsome travelling bag, a case of pipes and a box of cigars. That of the A.O.H. was accompanied by a purse of \$100.

There was a large attendance at the joint presentation which took place at St. Dunstan's Hall. Thos. L. Kane president of the A.O.H. was in the chair. After a chorus, "The Harp that Once Through Tara's Halls," Mr. P. J. Hughes read the address and made the presentation on behalf of the A.O.H. Addresses were delivered by Rev. Father Donahoe, Judge Barry, Vice-President Coyle of the A.O.H., Pres. R. H. O'Brien of the C.M.B.A., Ald. W. E. Farrell, P. J. Hughes, John O'Neill, James Hughes, County President E. C. Barry of the A.O.H. There was also readings by Harry Cox and W. A. Walsh and a solo by G. T. Feeney.

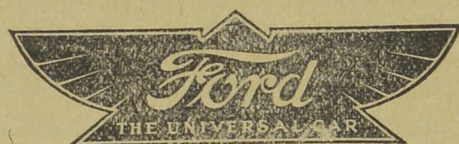
