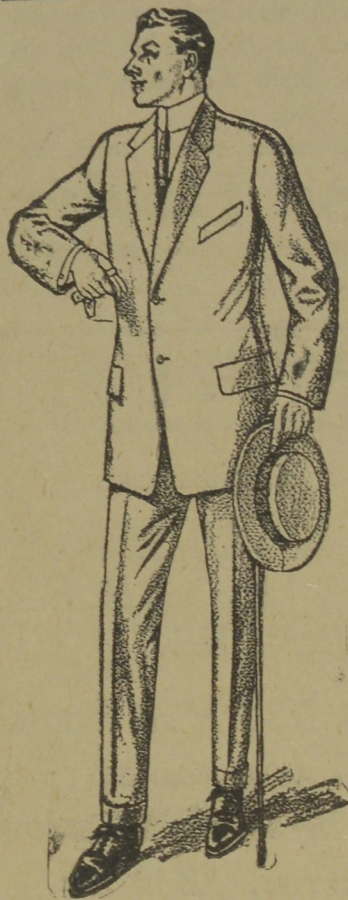

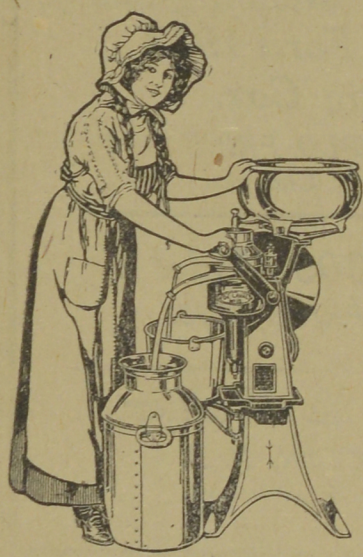

BATTING NELSON WELL DRUBBED BY GILBERT GALLANT

Veteran Had no Chance in Twelve-Round Bout—Gallant Made First Class Showing

Boston, April 30—Battling Nelson, the old master of the lightweights, will not forget very soon the inaugural meeting of the Atlas A. A. at the Arena last night. Gilbert Gallant, the promising lightweight of Chelsea, gave him about the worst lacing he has received for some time in their 12-round bout there.

Not only did Gallant win in a canter but he displayed better ability than he ever before showed in any contest in this section. From start to finish of the bout there was nothing to it but Gallant and the old master was about the first to declare Gallant was a great boxer.

The old fighting spirit is left in the Battler but the speed and steam are lacking. Gallant fought him in a heady manner as was shown particularly when they got to close quarters. Even at roughing it Gallant proved the better man.

ROCKS BATTLER'S HEAD.

In most of the rounds Nelson landed a few jabs, but there was not a great amount of steam behind them and he never got away without getting either a left counter on the ear or jaw. Often Gallant worked the right and left several times on the face and body before they clinched.

Many times the old Battler's head was rocked but he never backed away. Once Gallant put him down on his hands and knees with a left hook and several other times Nelson would have gone to the mat had he not got a hold on Gallant.

A couple of times it looked as if the curtain was about to be drawn on the old battler, but the gong came to his assistance. It was remarkable the way he came back, after the minute's rest, apparently as fresh as when he started. He tried to get Gallant's "goat" by talking to him while they were boxing, but he found he could not bother the Chelsea lad.

Repeatedly Nelson tried to puzzle Gallant with his old style of feinting, but Gallant would step in with a stiff left jab on the nose and send the Battler's head back. Often Gallant followed this up with several rights and lefts on the face and body.

Gallant stepped about the ring in good style and a number of times avoided Nelson's drives for the jaw.

Although Nelson has gone back, the victory was a good boost for Gallant and it helps to prime him for harder game. His manager, Aleck McLean, is now going to send Gallant after some of the topnotchers in the lightweight division.

Jack Sheehan, who was the referee of the bout, had an easy time giving a decision and he awarded the bout to Gallant at the end of the twelve rounds.

FRANK LEONARD WORKING HARD ON BANGOR SITUATION

Some Money Already Subscribed and More is Available—Magoon Will Work Team Out at U. of M.

Bangor, Me., April 30—With nearly \$500 pledged, the prospects for a baseball team for Bangor are looking brighter, according to the statement of Manager Frank J. Leonard, of the St. John club who is here in the interests of the Maine New Brunswick League. It will be necessary before starting the club here to raise \$1000 and with the interest that is being shown Mr. Leonard said he believed that it would not take a great deal longer to raise the required amount.

"There are some of your Bangor men who should like to see this city in the New England League," said Mr. Leonard, "but that is entirely out of the question. The city is too far away. Bangor has had its experience with a Maine League and has found that the cities to the west are not sufficiently enthusiastic to furnish the backing necessary nor is there the stability necessary to support a team. If Bangor wants baseball it must look to the New Brunswick cities for it.

"The Maine-New Brunswick" teams financial basis and what is more financial basis and what is more the New Brunswick cities are requiring each team to put up a bond of \$500 as a guarantee that it will continue through the entire season."

Mr. Leonard says that full 60 per cent of those upon whom he has called have responded by subscribing for shares of the stock in the club.

According to the present indication George Magoon the coach of the University of Maine baseball team is likely to become the manager of the local club. He has had plenty of experience and is so located at the present time that he could work out the team on the university field. He is anxious to affiliate himself with Bangor for the season and there is every reason to believe that he will do this.

As soon as Mr. Leonard completes the sale of stock a meeting of business men will be called to organize the stock holders and at the time a treasurer will be elected to take charge of the finances for the season. Mr. Leonard is anxious to complete the work and get back to St. John where he has his own team to look after and it is believed that a few days more will find the \$1000 subscribed.

INTERSTATE LEAGUE OPENED TODAY

Columbus, O. May 1—This was the opening day of the season in the Interstate Baseball League a practically new organization in the territory formerly occupied by the eastern end of the old Central League. The circuit comprises six of the old Central League cities namely Akron, Zanesville, Youngstown, Canton, Erie and Wheeling. The addition of Columbus and Steubenville gives the organization an eight-hole course. The Columbus team will play on the American Association grounds when the A. A. team is away from home, which will give this city continuous baseball through the season.

The managers engaged to pilot the Interstate clubs are: Akron, John Seigel, formerly of the Cincinnati Reds; Zanesville, Marty Hogan; Youngstown, Charley Blout, Canton, Bode Meyers; Erie, Larry Quinlan; Wheeling, J. Robinson, Columbus, Lee Fohl and Steubenville, Roy Montgomery.

Several of the cities in the league were hard hit by the recent floods, but despite this fact all of the club owners believe that the outlook is bright for a successful season and an interesting pennant race. The season will close September 16.

JOHNSON'S TRIAL ON WHITE SLAVE CHARGE, MONDAY

Additional Indictment Brought Against Him—Former Trainer Kenny Called Before Grand Jury as Witness

Chicago, Ill., April 30—An additional indictment amendatory of a previous indictment, was returned today by the Federal Grand Jury charging "Jack" Johnson, the negro prize fighter, with violation of the Mann White Slave Act. The indictment alleges that Johnson brought Belle Schreiber, "otherwise known as Mrs. J. Johnson," from Pittsburgh to Chicago October 15, 1910, for "immoral purposes and in preparation of a serious crime."

The fighter was in court when the indictment was returned and entered a plea of not guilty. His trial is set for next Monday.

CALL KENNY IN CASE.

Chicago, April 29—With the trial of the negro pugilist, Jack Johnson, on a charge of violating the Mann White Slave Act, only a week away, "Yank" Kenney, the defendant's former trainer, was called before the Federal Grand Jury here today. He gave evidence in connection with the indictments on which Johnson will go to trial.

New York, April 30—Luther McCarty outfought Frank Moran, the Pittsburgh heavyweight, in a ten-round bout tonight.

DICKERING OVER PROPOSED TRADE OF HAL CHASE

New York Would Like Catcher Cady in Trade—McAleer not Optimistic About the Deal

New York, April 29—There were no new developments today in the efforts of the Boston Red Sox to secure Hal Chase, the great first baseman of the New York Club.

Manager Stahl received an inside tip that the Highlanders were willing to listen to a proposition and he approaches Manager Chance yesterday morning and talked the matter over. Chance said that he considered Chase a star ball player, and that if he let him go he wanted a star in return.

Manager Stahl could not afford to let any of his stars go in a trade, and tried to show the Peerless Leader how he could strengthen the New York Club with a catcher, a second baseman and outfielder whom Boston has under contract and is willing to give for Chase.

Manager Chance is not familiar with the playing of the Red Sox individually, and so was not in a position to come down to business; but it was intimated that New York liked Forrester Cady for a catcher.

While Stahl is anxious to make the deal, Chance is likely to hold off, as two other American League clubs have sent word that they would like to bid for Chase. While Chance is in shape to play first base he figures that the only way to market Chase, is to show him off at first base, where he has no equal.

MCALDER NOT OPTIMISTIC

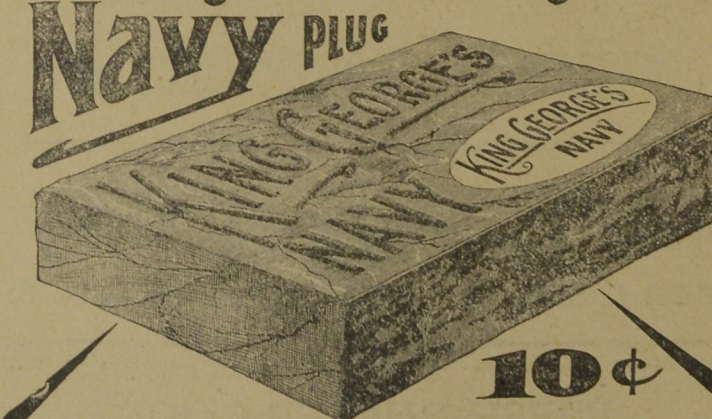
Pres. McAleer said last night that he had received no advices from Stahl regarding the deal, and that his only information on the subject was obtained from the news dispatches sent out from New York.

Pres. McAleer admitted that he would like to secure Chase or any other player who would strengthen the Boston team that could be secured by trade or purchase outright, but he did not appear to be very optimistic over the prospects of getting the New Yorker.
