

the efforts to re-elect former Congressman Littlefield, of Maine, the present representative from that district, Daniel J. McGillicuddy, Littlefield was to be supported by the National Association of Manufacturers because of his stand against labor legislation. Mulhall said on cross-examination that he had been told \$60,000 was spent in that campaign. Littlefield was beaten.
