FACE THE ISSUE SQUARELY

"Moved by Sir George Ross, seconded by Hon. Hewitt Bostock, that this House do not justify in granting assent to this Bill until it is submitted to the judgment of the country."

This was the senate's answer to the open and veiled threats of Premier Borden and his press that unless the senate abandoned all claim to a share in the government of the country and dropped into the perils position of accepting any measure the government would propose he would take steps to remove or so alter the senate as to make it a perfectly useless appendage of Parliament.

The motion was presented after prolonged and grave deliberation by the Liberal Senators. It was presented with a brilliant and patriotic speech by that veteran imperialist, Sir George Ross and was received with unanimous applause by the Liberal Senators. It passed the senate on Thursday night by a majority of 24, and Premier Borden now finds himself face to face with his pledges to appeal to the people if Parliament refused whatever he might demand as an emergency contribution to England.

It was a memorable scene and for once the senate attracted the attention of the whole of Canada to the exclusion of the House of Commons. It was a scene made the more memorable by the powerful stand taken against Premier Borden's policy by the very man whom Mr. Borden in his Toronto speech has designated as "a sound Imperialist."

Sir George Ross, the Liberal leader, also made it clear throughout his speech that the action of the Senate had not been dictated in the slightest degree by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, as Mr. Borden had tried to insinuate. In ringing tones he denounced Mr. Borden's remarks as offensive and declared:—

"We are not here to suit any premier, leader of the Opposition, or anybody else. We are here to do our own sweet will according to our judgment and good conscience," and then Sir George challenged Mr. Borden to say definitely what his threat meant and not to "shoot darts into the air."

The careful manner in which the senate had kept its counsels regarding the naval bill was further shown by the fact that Sir George Ross' speech of nearly two hours was listened to with close attention by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who attended the senate as a simple commoner, outside the bar in order to learn directly what the senate proposed to do.

What the Liberal leader proposed was exactly what the Conservative leader in the senate proposed to do with the Laurier Naval Bill in 1910—defer it until the people had been consulted. If that was good doctrine for the senate in 1910 it must be equally good in 1913.

The position of the Liberals, however is much stronger today. The Laurier naval bill of 1910 was framed on a resolution passed by an unanimous Parliament; it was couched within the four walls of the British North America Act, the Canadian Constitution; it had been discussed and approved by the people. The Borden Naval Bill was the child of dissension in the Commons and throughout the country; it had never been passed upon by the people, and it proposed to do something not contemplated by our Constitution. So if Senator Loughheed was right in his motion of 1910 Senator Ross was infinitely more right in moving the same motion now.

Mr. Alfred Austin, the British poet laureate died on Monday at the age of seventy-seven. He achieved success as a lawyer, novelist, war correspondent and political writer.

Hon. Sydney A. Fisher for many years minister of agriculture will be the Liberal candidate in Chateauguay P.Q. the seat vacated by the death of Mr. Brown, M.P.

The Montreal Star and other Tory papers are doing their level best to stir up feeling against the senate because of its action in amending the thirty-five million dollar naval bill. The Star's special correspondents in the various provinces have been able to discover that there is "anger and shame" over the senate's act. The anger and shame which exists in New Brunswick is voiced by Col. Baxter, M. P. for St. John County, who appears to think that the jig is up so far as the safety of the empire is concerned. The gallant colonel says that the senate's action instead of making war impossible has invited an attack, and in doing this it has not faithfully represented the popular will. The colonel has been preparing for war for some years and no doubt he will be ready to do his duty should an attack come. In the meantime he will probably continue to draw his salary as recorder of St. John.

Mr. C. E. Tanner, who has led the forlorn hope in the Nova Scotia Legislature off and on for about twenty years, tells a Montreal Star reporter that Canada has been humiliated by the senate's action in rejecting the naval bill, and that it is a distinct blow to empire unity. This peevish leader of Toryism does not favor an election, but he thinks the Liberal members of the House of Commons should resign their seats and test public opinion at the polls. If Mr. Tanner is correctly reported by the Star it is quite easy to understand why he has been such a great political failure.

The reptile Tory press tells us that there is great indignation throughout Canada against the senate because it held up the naval bill. This may be true, but so far as our own city is concerned we have yet to learn of a single man, woman or child who has lost any sleep over the question. Why, even that great, and noble patriot Adolphus Duncan Thomas continues to sort school books in the basement of the departmental building, and instead of laying plans for the defence of the empire he is wondering how he is going to work the government for another salary increase next year.

Not content with saddling an additional burden upon the city of eight hundred dollars per year for the support of the Provincial Hospital and an extra three hundred dollars toward the cost of the maintenance of the Model School the Flemming Government tried to compel the city to defray the cost of repairing a bridge on the Wisley Road. The chairman of the city road committee, however, refused to be bluffed, and as a result the bridge in question is being repaired at the expense of the government.

His Majesty King George has conferred the title of knight bachelor upon Hon. Frederick E. Barker, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick. A distinguished jurist and a worthy man Sir Frederick well deserves the great honor which has been conferred upon him by his sovereign.

Mr. Borden is planning to spend a quarter of a billion dollars during the ensuing year. Where, oh where, is that great stickler for economy, Oswald Smith Crockett, M.P. for York?

If the Borden government has the courage to go to the people on the naval question a lot of Tory politicians and office holders will find themselves face to face with a real live emergency.
