clinical lavatory is dirty and cannot be otherwise as it is surrounded by coal dust and ashes from the furnace.

Dr. Weaver, the other member of the delegation, saw much need for suggested improvements and believed the public would be found as willing today as in the past to back up the trustees in a practical manner.

TRUSTEES HEARD.

Mr. McMurray and Ald. Farrell, members of the Trustees Committee, also gave their views which coincided with the statement of the president. Mr. McMurray thought, owing to lack of funds any extension would have to be built of wood, while Ald. Farrell advocated inviting a provincial architect to ascertain the cost of the work as outlined by the medical staff. Notwithstanding the eight or ten additional rooms asked for His Worship the Mayor wanted one more and a big one. In order to more thoroughly equip graduates he would have an obstetric department provided. Mr. VanDine thought whatever was decided, additional work placed on the building should be so constructed and be of such character that it would form the nucleus for future enlargement. Ald. Clark felt that almost indefinite enlargement was needed, for he felt that the present quarters of the nurses was far from the standard of sleeping apartments most people covet. It was felt that the present condition of things at the hospital should be improved and the secretary was instructed to invite Architect Brodie to meet with the trustees and staff and give some advice on the premises.

No definite scale of prices for the use of the new X-Ray machine having been fixed this matter was left in the hands of Ald. Clark, the secretary and the matron.

Some needed repairs to the roof of the main building and clearing about the basement was relegated to the judgment of the Repairs Committee, as was also the providing of an acetylene stove for water heating in the corridors.

As Dr. Mullin was unable to give the necessary time to prepare certain statistics for the annual report, the secretary was directed to solicit other aid.

TO MEET ARCHITECT.

Upon the motion of the mayor, the president, Mr. McMurray, Ald. Clark, Ald. Farrell and Mr. VanDine were appointed a committee to meet with the architect and find out the size and probable cost of such a building as asked for by the medical staff.

Before closing considerable discussion took place in reference to bills submitted month after month, there not being sufficient detail as to dates and prices and it was ordered that in future all accounts must be in the hands of the secretary-treasurer for audit not later than the Thursday preceding the first Monday of every month.

have been absolutely removed from the canals which serve the provinces of Ontario and Quebec. The millions which are collected from the people of the Maritime Provinces through the rates on the Intercolonial will be applied to meet the cost of maintaining the canals for the central portion of Canada and to pay interest for the benefit of the west on advances to the Grand Trunk Pacific and the Canadian Northern.

"I do not think that the east is being fairly dealt with and believe that this matter must be thoroughly threshed out in the House." It is expected that there will be a full debate in a day or so.

The numbering is necessary in order to deliver mail but complaint is made that in Woodstock Road where houses are numbered mail is not delivered.

dolph, president of the New Brunswick & British Colonization Company quoted the price of that company to the city of the Scully's Grove property exclusive of two lots on Regent Street owned by McLaughlin Bros. and on which the company could not obtain an option. The price quoted is \$20,000 and as the land comprises only six and a half acres is considered by the City Council to be excessive and will not be considered. The land upon which this price is placed has about the same boundaries as the present grounds used by the Fredericton Baseball Club and was bought by the company, it is understood for less than half the price quoted. Mr. Fitz Randolph's letter giving the price referred to the fact that the McLaughlin lots were assessed at \$1000 and that in view of that fact the valuation placed by the company was not excessive.

STREET EXTENSION.

A largely signed petition was before the City Council in committee last night which prayed that Union street be extended in a south-easterly direction across the I.R.C. tracks to Union street. The matter has been referred to the Road Committee.

The matter of extending Aberdeen street in a similar way was also before the committee. Ald. Mitchell stated that Ex-Ald. Thos. C. Allen was preparing to erect a dwelling in University Avenue on the land which would be required for the extension of this street. Mr. Allen wanted \$1,200 for his land and part of Dr. L. W. Bailey's property also would be required. After discussion it was decided that it would not be advisable to extend the street at such a cost when it was possible that there would be difficulty in getting the right of way across the I.R.C. tracks. An attempt however, will be made to obtain a portion of the north-westerly end of the U.N.B. athletic grounds in order to widen Aberdeen street extension as far as the I.R.C. tracks. This extension has been built up for some years. Previous attempts to use part of the U.N.B. land to widen the street have failed.

AGED PROTECTIONIST

A man hailing from St. Stephen and giving his age as twenty-five years was a protectionist at the police station last night. He arrived here from St. Stephen. Protectionists so advanced in years are not common here.

SIR THOS. TAIT HERE

Sir Thos. Tait president of the Fredericton & Grand Lake Coal Company arrived here from Montreal at noon today on business connected with the line.

CITY ENGINEER

Mr. G. Skiff Grimmer of St. Andrew's has applied for the position of City Engineer of Fredericton. He asks for a salary of \$1,200 per year or \$1,000 with privileges of doing outside work. He was graduated by U. N. B. in 1911 and has been working at St. Andrew's with the Canadian Sardine Company for the past year.
