UNIQUE DIVISION ON DIVORCE BILL

Ottawa, June 3—A unique situation, and unprecedented division developed in the House of Commons tonight, when two divorce bills recommended by the senate were submitted to the Commons for approval. Divorces recommended, respectively, for Frank William Meek of Toronto, and Lenore Power of Cobourg, both occasioned vigorous discussion of the whole question of granting divorce in Canada.

Dr. Steele, who opposed the Meek divorce, declared that there were in Toronto and other urban parts of Ontario, "hundreds of women who, on account of the conduct of their husbands, have to leave and go and earn their living in domestic service or by housekeeping," and there was no justification for granting such husbands divorce from the facts that their wives had left them.

"If this divorce is granted," said Mr. Boys, in dealing with the Power case, "then it is just as easy to get divorces from this Parliament as to get them in Reno."

Mr. Carvell took the ground that Parliament was not the proper tribunal to deal with such cases, but believed that while the law was as it was, it should be strictly adhered to.

Mr. Crockett, Chairman of the Private Bills Committee, reported in favor of both divorces being granted.

No vote was taken upon the Meek case, which went through without division, but Mr. Carroll called for the first divorce bill division in over twenty years on the power case. The House voted on a unique division. The front benches were divided, Premier Borden and his seat against one another, as did Wilfrid Laurier and his seat mate, Hon. Geo. P. Graham. Premier Borden, Hon. Mr. Graham, Hon. Mr. Hazen, Hon. Mr. Oliver and other voted for the granting of divorce. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. Mr. Rogers, Hon. Dr. Beland, Hon. Mr. Cochrane and others voted against it.

The divorce was thrown out by a vote of 4 to 22.

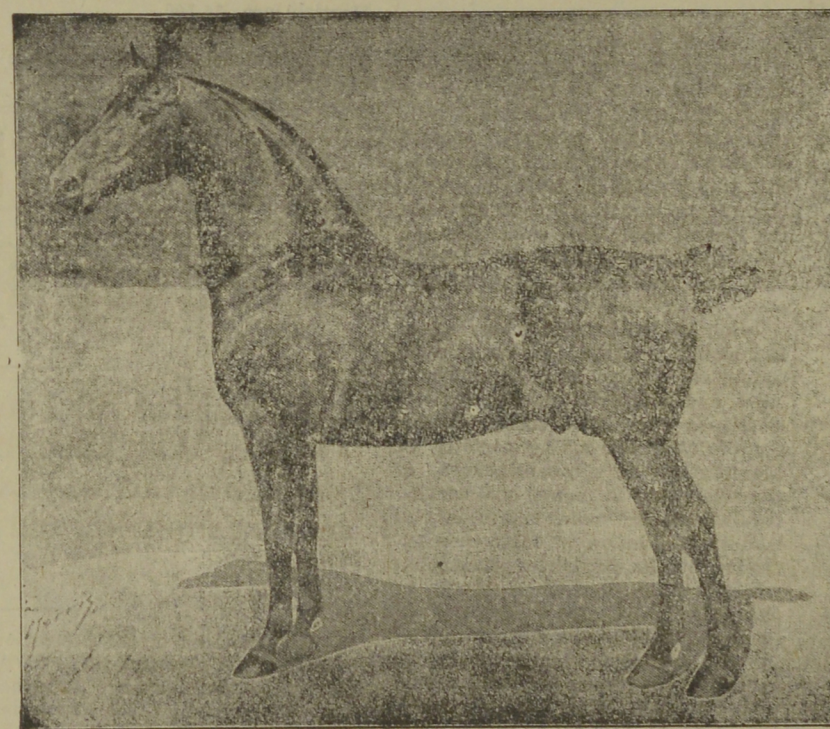
