A CANADIAN 'ROASTS' THE ANGLICAN CHURCH

London, June 5—Bishop Graham Ingraham an influential prelate of the Church of England, who recently toured Canada in connection with the Anglican Mission Help under the auspices of the Archbishop of Canterbury, publishes a volume here which includes a searching indictment of the church of England in Canada.


The writer is an anonymous Canadian clergyman. He says:

"The church which, instead of holding first place among the Protestant bodies, is a bad third and in some places even fourth, has miserably failed to act in the capacity of a leader in moulding the character and morals of the Canadian people."

"The greatest hindrance to the progress of the church in Canada has been the constant quarrelling between the high and low factions. It has been simply pitiful to see congregation split up and almost destroyed over some inane question such as whether a clergyman should wear a cassock, or not, or where a cross should be placed that some persons wished to present to the church."

It is a thousand pities that the clergy do not take the plain prayer book, stand and give a simple service to the people, instead of continually worrying them over ornaments and useless accessories.

"The budgets of the Methodists and the Presbyterian churches are statements of finance that compared with those of the Anglican Church look like a millionaires income in contrast with that of a second class school teacher."



SUNBURY RAILWAY CASE WILL BE APPEALED

Mr. Harding Claims He Has Not Had a Square Deal From the Company

The judgment of His Honor Judge McLeod in the case of the Fredericton & Grand Lake Coal and Railway Company against James P. Harding, which has caused considerable interest in the section of Sunbury through which the road runs, has been received by the Registrar of the Court. The action was brought to enforce performance of an agreement entered into by Mr. Harding with the Railway Company, by which he agreed to convey to them the right of way for the railway through his property, land for station grounds and a roadway across his property leading from the station to the highway. The dispute between the parties arose more particularly over the compensation and location of the roadway.

Judge McLeod held that notwithstanding the statement under oath of Mr. Harding, that the Railway Company promised to pay him, in addition to \$250 agreed upon for the right of way and station grounds, and \$50 for the roadway, he could not recover the latter sum, inasmuch as through an oversight or misunderstanding the additional amount for the roadway was not inserted in the written agreement and Mr. Harding had signed it when it stated the amount at \$250, he having failed to notice the omission of the additional \$50.

His Honor also held that inasmuch as the written agreement had not designated the particular location of the roadway across the farm, connecting with the highway, the option or right of selection devolved upon the company and their choice of the roadway running through the centre of the farm, between his house and one of his barns, although calculated to cause considerable inconvenience to him in his farming operations, was binding upon him and he would be decreed to make a conveyance of this strip for the roadway.

Mr. Harding, considering this inequitable unjust and unfair and being dissatisfied with the judgment, has concluded to appeal the case to the full court.

He has repeatedly offered to give the company a roadway along the upper line of his lot, adjoining the Miles farm, without compensation, if the company would abandon their claim to the road through the center of his farm. It is generally regarded that this would give a roadway and approach to the station grounds equally, if not more satisfactory to the general public and to all concerned, without doing Mr. Harding unnecessary damage and it is said that friends and neighbors are so desirous for the change that they have proposed to build the roadway along the division line if the company will accept it in lieu of the location through the valuable portion of his farm, which they now insist upon.

In this connection it may be stated, the report recently published in a local paper that the company had offered Mr. Harding \$500 and that he wanted \$2000, is entirely unwarranted.

As a matter of fact, before the railway was definitely located and when private arrangements were being made for the right of way with proprietors, Mr. Lorne Merrithew, acting for the company, offered Mr. Harding \$300 for the right of way, station grounds and roadway. Mr. Harding asked \$500. He finally, after negotiations with the company, agreed to accept \$300 and supposed he was to receive at least that sum, but under the terms of the written agreement, as now interpreted by the judge, he receives only \$250 for all the land included in the agreement and the company escapes payment of the additional amount, although forcing the roadway, if the decree is allowed to stand, right through the centre of his valuable farm.


