HON. L. O. DAVID DEFENDS THE SENATE'S POSITION

To the Editor of the Montreal Star—Sir,—In view of the storm of accusations and insinuations raised by the vote of the senate and especially of the French members of that body on the question of the contribution to the Imperial Navy, will you allow me to submit to your readers a resume of the principal reasons which induced us to ask that the Borden policy be not accepted before having been ratified by the people.

1. We were convinced that there was no emergency, and if there were consequently a pressing need, the construction of three Dreadnoughts which must take about three years was not the best means of helping England, because it is possible, even probable that if there is to be a war, it would occur within three years before the vessels were built.

2. If the policy of the late government had been carried out, it within three or four years a case of emergency had arisen, the Canadians would have done what they did in the South African war, they would have sent what was needed, men, soldiers and ammunition.

3. There was therefore no reason for departing from the policy adopted unanimously by the House of Commons in 1909, nothing to justify the members of the Senate in repudiating the naval law which had been proposed by the late Government in order to carry such policy into effect and which they accepted in 1911.

4. If they can be rightly accused of

partizanship when they were consistent what can one say of the Conservatives who were so inconsistent and who have so much difficulty in justifying their change of views?

5. We were convinced that the moral effect which was expected, and which was so great when the House of Commons in 1909 voted unanimously for the establishment of a Canadian navy was annihilated and could only be revived by the return to that policy.

6. In view of the dissensions to which the new policy has given rise and owing to the fact that at least three members of the Government and twenty members of the House of Commons had been elected to oppose such policy, unless it was previously submitted to and approved of by the people, we had reason to believe that it had been adopted contrary to the wishes of the electors and that the only way of making it acceptable to England and Canada was to have it ratified by the people.

7. We thought that before embarking on such a policy, which might seriously affect our destinies and our relations with the Mother Country, the different Provinces of the Dominion should have the representation they are entitled to under the last census and that the Government should make known to Parliament their permanent policy, so as to enable us to pronounce ourselves with a full knowledge of the facts on the whole question of Imperial and Canadian defence.

8. It is true that we voted in 1910 against the submission of the Laurier Navy project to the people, but this project was nothing more than the development of the well known policy embodied in the Constitution Act of 1867, advocated since the establishment of Confederation by the leaders of both parties unanimously adopted by the House of Commons in 1909, while the other is new and constitutes evidently a departure from that old and national policy and is considered by prominent lawyers as contrary to the spirit of our constitution.

9. We thought that the scheme of the Government, if adopted under such circumstances was not the best way of safeguarding the interests of Canada and of the Empire, of securing the accomplishment of our destinies and of preserving our national autonomy and our friendly relations with the Mother Country.

Such are the principal reasons which induced us to think that we could not properly change our views and repudiate the policy which was adopted as being the most beneficial to the Empire and to Canada unless the people decided otherwise.

I think, Sir, that our motives deserve consideration, and that they are sufficient to convince all reasonable persons that the members of the senate whether English, French or Irish whether Conservative or Liberal had reason to think that their duty was to do what they had done; refer the question to the judgment of the people, the supreme judge in political matters.

Now allow me to add that we French-Canadians have reason to contend that we have the right to hold such views in common with the British Liberals of this country without being subject to accusations of partizanship and disloyalty; that we the British flag and that we acknowledge that we owe to England and ledge that no other flag would give the same measure of protection to our political and national rights, but we want to be as free as all other British subjects, to do what we consider to be right and just according to our judgment and conscience.

PEPPER MUCH ADULTERATED

Ground pepper, according to recent analysis conducted in the laboratory of the Department of Inland Revenue, continues to be among the most extensively adulterated foodstuffs on the market. This judgment, pronounced by the chief analysis is the result of an examination of 273 samples of white pepper taken from merchants' stocks throughout Canada. Of the whole, 215 samples were found genuine, 53 adulterated and 5 doubtful. Therefore 19 per cent. of the total was condemned. A like examination in 1910 showed only 17 per cent. of the samples to be adulterated. The situation is not improving. The adulterants are chiefly starches intended to give bulk to the stuff when sold and are not calculated to injure the health of the consumer. Their use is none the less a fraudulent practice, which it would be well to stop.

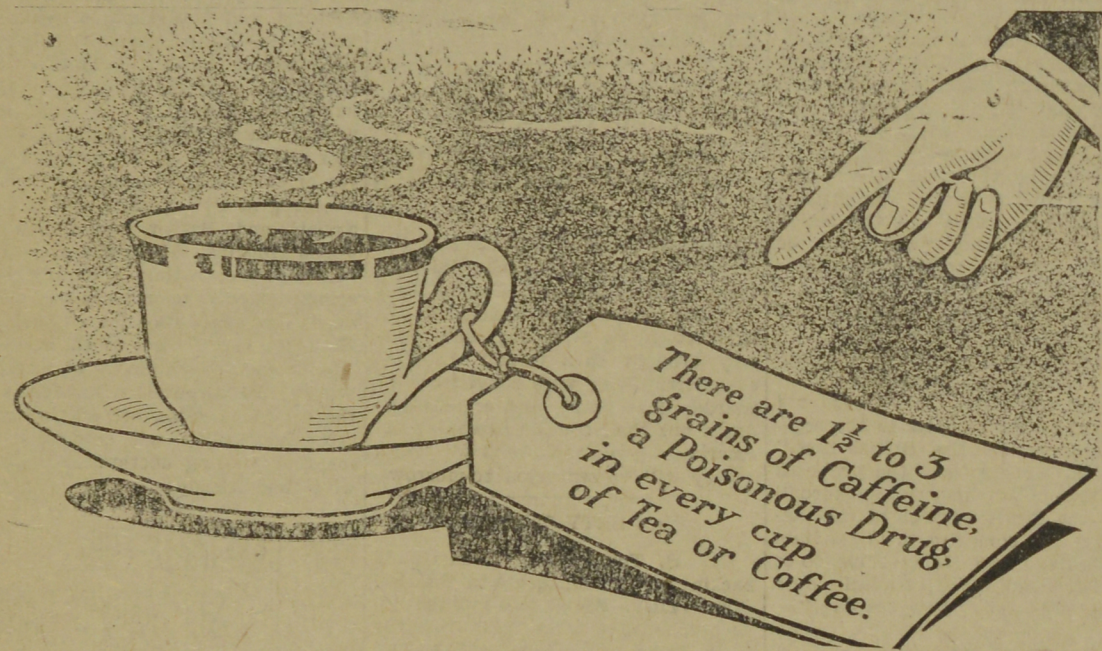
