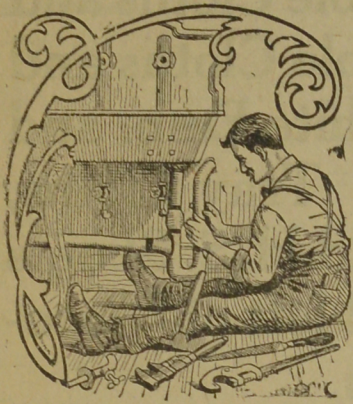

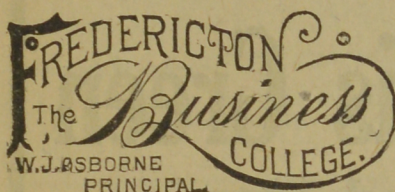

HAVE NARROW ESCAPE WHEN CANOE UPSETS

Woodstock, June 19.—R. L. Boyer,
warden of Victoria County,
who was in town yesterday, and
Miss Ida Rideout and Miss Hanni-
gan, started from the boathouse at
the foot of Queen street about 9.30
last evening to enjoy a canoe
trip. They were sailing down
abreast of the Island
when they heard a voice calling a
short distance behind. It proved to
be Miss Hannigan's brother and the
canoe was turned to wait for him.
The current was swift and his boat
was going fast. Before the canoe
could be paddled out of his way it
was struck amidships and completely
turned over, throwing the three in-
mates into the water.

Boyer immediately dove down and
brought Miss Rideout to the surface
and she was pulled into the boat by
Hannigan. Boyer then went after
Miss Hannigan and succeeded, after
a hard struggle, in getting her into
the boat.

Boyer's clothing, which contained a
watch and \$45 was in the canoe and,
strange to say, were still there when
the canoe was righted. The place
where the accident occurred is near
a shear boom where the current is
swift and about 20 feet in depth.

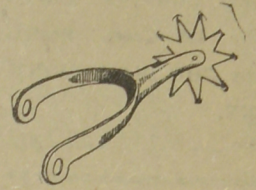
