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## SOME COOD ADVICE

The Toronto Globe gives some good advice to Canadians, which it would be well for every one to act upon at this juncture. It points out that short cuts to greatness do not always land those who take them at the desired goal. A mighty lot of the energy, and thought, and capital of Canadians has been devoted during the past five years to the blowing of financial soap bubbles. There are thousands of people today dazed and down-hearted because their bubbles have burst. The greatest inflation of all was in Western city lots. A few great fortunes have been made out of the boom and a considerable number of moderate ones, but very many purchasers find themselves in possession of land that will not be required for years for building purposes, and that instead of returning immediate profit will have to be "carried" at much cost and sacrifice.

The waterlogged stocks of not a few industrial undertakings have absorbed much of the capital of the country. They, too, will have to be nursed and cared for till the consuming market becomes large enough to provide profits on the water poured into industrial capitalization. In addition to the locking of capital in real estate and industrial capital which, it must be remembered, changed hands in the process and passed from "savers" to "spenders," and must have been in no small degree dissipated in luxurious living—there have been vast sums sunk in public works and services such as railways that have not yet begun to earn interest on the money invested. The interest must as yet be met either by supplementary borrowings or out of the proceeds of other wealth-producing industries.

This triple burden—the carrying of unproductive real estate, of inflated industrial securities, and of public services that have not yet been sufficiently developed to carry themselves—is not beyond the strength and the resources of the Canadian people if they will get down to work again, to hard, steady, wealth-producing work, on the farm, in the mine, in the forest, and in the factory. The country is amazingly rich in natural wealth. Every man who is willing to work should be given an opportunity to turn that natural wealth into marketable form. The Minister of Finance, who must know the situation, should do everything possible to direct public and private expenditures into reproductive channels. The other day the Globe heard of a ten-story building in a certain Canadian city, seven stories of which were without occupants. If the money put into such a building were put into a dozen small factories it would have given profitable and permanent employment to hundreds of men. We have become too fond of the spectacular. We have gone out after the "biggest" and the "finest" forgetting the fact that a young nation, like a young couple setting up housekeeping must be content to buy warily if the millstone of debt is to be avoided.

Tory politicians and newspapers have been telling us that under the terms of the Underwood tariff bill Canada will get all it would have got under the reciprocity agreement and will give nothing in return. Despatches from Washington tell us that the senate has decided to impose an advalorem duty of ten per cent. on potatoes imported from countries which exact a duty on potatoes from the United States. This will of course apply to Canada.

We are glad to note that Provincial Secretary McLeod has been giving some attention to the Springhill road. This is one of the most important highways in the county and should be maintained in first class condition. No doubt there are many auto owners in this vicinity who would be willing to contribute towards the cost of improving this road.

DANIEL MULLIN K. C.  
AND THE JUDGESHIP

The reports that have appeared in the daily press within the last few days lend color to the rumor of the promotion of Mr. Daniel Mullin of this city to the Supreme Court bench. Mr. Mullin has had a long and honorable career at the bar in New Brunswick and has handled the two edged sword of the law in a manner that reflects credit upon himself and his associates of the legal profession. Mr. Mullin has been counsel in some of the most important legal battles that have been fought in the province, and the able manner in which he conducted himself showed that he was a man of more than ordinary legal ability. Two years ago he was selected by the present minister of Justice to look after Canadian interests in a question of international importance with the result that the case was decided in favor of Canada. At a time when we need the very best that our province can give for the judiciary, we believe that Mr. Mullin's knowledge and experience gained after long years of practice at the bar eminently qualify him for the bench and that his choice would be a most happy one. Mr. Mullin will undoubtedly have the unanimous support of one of the largest and most influential portions of the population of this province, and other things being equal our leading Catholic people should see that Mr. Mullin's religion is no bar to his well deserved promotion. If our present leaders of the day fancy that under the slightest pretext they can ignore the just claims of our nominees for public office then we must advise them that they are playing a losing game. A new era seems to be dawning for the Catholic people in these provinces when it is hoped that by united and determined action they shall come into their own. We are out for the "square deal" and we expect to receive the same consideration that we are prepared to give to others.
