Moncton the party came to McGivney by the National Transcontinental Railway and thence by I.R.C. The special train of the Minister and his party consists of three cars which is lying today on a siding near the I.R.C. yard.

LEAVING FOR DERBY JCT.

The party intends to leave for Derby Junction at 5.30 p.m. This trip is for the purpose of inspecting that portion of the Canada Eastern branch of the I.R.C. between Blackville and Chatham Junction which it is proposed to abandon. This line is paralleled on the opposite side of Miramichi River by the Indiantown Branch and it is claimed that the latter line alone can serve the country. There has been a loud protest against the suggested abandonment however and the minister's visit will determine whether that portion of the line will be put in good condition or abandoned.

INSPECTED VALLEY RAILWAY

This morning Hon. Mr. Cochrane and his party accompanied by Mr. Taylor, departmental engineer on the construction of St. John & Quebec Railway made a trip by motor-car to Holyoke's some eighteen miles above the city and returned at 1 p.m. This afternoon the party is to inspect the I.R.C. terminals in the city.

Hon. Mr. Cochrane, the minister, when asked by a reporter for the Mail if there was anything he cared to say concerning his visit to Fredericton said there was nothing. Mr. Gutelius when approached by the reporter said that there was little that could be told the public with the regard with the inspection here.

The matter of location of the line of the St. John & Quebec Railway in Fredericton, the site for the station, improvement of I.R.C. terminals and so on, comprise a merit for consideration. These matters must all be dealt with latter. Our visit at the present time is mainly for the purpose of getting an idea of the geography of this part of the country and of the needs of the situation.

It is understood that Mr. Gutelius will revisit Fredericton at an early date. Mr. O. S. Crockett, M. P., made the arrangements in connection with today's visit.

MARYSVILLE TOPICS

**Rate Payers Complaining of the Raise
in Their Taxes--No More Beer to be
Sold in Town--New School hrs.**

Marysville, June 23--There seems to be quite a hurry of excitement among the ratepayers, here at present. It seems that it will be necessary this year to raise the taxes, in order to make up the amount of assessment which is large. As a great many heavy tax-payers have left Marysville, it will make it harder for those left to pay, thus the raise in the rates. In the past few years the following families who contributed largely to the taxes have moved away--Mr. Alfred Rowley and family; Mr. Thomas Likely and family; Mr. and Mrs. Fred Gamble, his mother and sister; Dr. Fisher and family; Mrs. George Cochrae; Mr. and Mrs. Frank Capen; Alex Forbes and family; Mr. and Mrs. George Foster and others. Then there are some property owners in Marysville who are out of employment and therefore refuse to pay an income tax, claiming that they have nothing coming in. Some of the citizens as well as a few of the aldermen, want all the modern, up-to-date improvements such as lights, sewerage, water protection and so forth but on the other hand don't want to pay for it, and put up a kick when their taxes are increased. Besides the families that have left Marysville several men and boys have gone to different places seeking employment.

Messrs William Heron and John Sullivan who are employed in Randolph's mill at St. John, spent Sunday in Marysville. The men in the mill where they are employed are on strike for 25 cents a day raise.

Mr. Samuel Woodside, superintendent of the Cotton Mill, personally interview the numerous people living in the company's houses who have been selling beer and asked them to stop at once as it was interfering with business throughout the mill. It is either stop selling light "boozie" or get out. This is a good idea as the beer business in our little town has grown very rapidly. When Mr. Gibson was mayor it was hard indeed to get a drink of beer in the town but since he gave up taking an active part in town affairs things have changed. 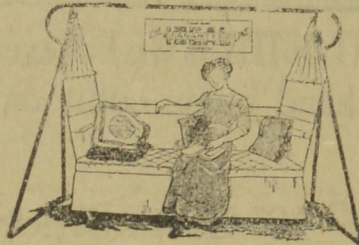

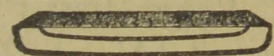

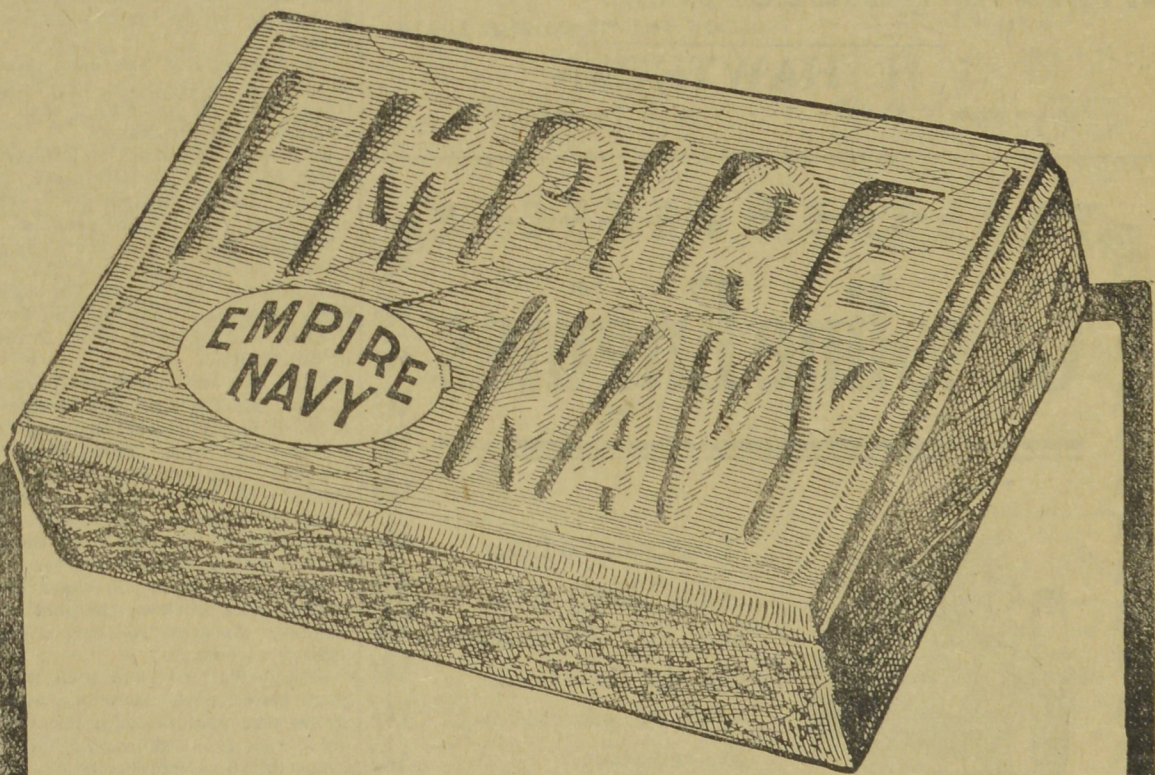
