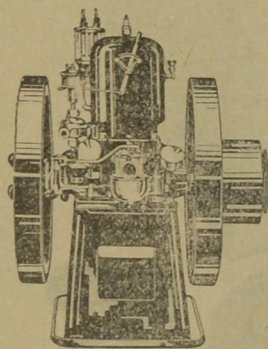

Calais, June 22—On the St. Stephen diamond Saturday afternoon the Calais and St. Stephen team defeated the fast Fredericton team by the score of 5 to 2. Manager Doyle sent Lee, the pride of the local pitching staff, to do the heaving and after Flynn, the first man up, drew a pass and Ganley doubled to right scoring Flynn, Duggan walked and Ganley was too venturesome and got out at third, Duggan, who took part in the attempt of the double steal, advanced to second. Lee threw wild over second but McPherson recovered the ball in time to prevent Duggan from scoring from third. It looked good for another run but Lee tightened up and struck out both White and Conley, one run.

The Doyle failed to score in their session. Edwards, the new side arm twirler of the Fredericton team, had some stuff on them in the way of speed and curves; no runs.

Neither side tallied in the second inning, which went through with a clever double play pulled off by Fryer, who nicely caught Vance's drive, throwing to Callahan and putting our Jacobson at the second station.

Third inning—After Edwards fled out, Fryer doubled to left field and scored on a bad throw of Gross to McPherson, who was taking the peg at second. Ganley popped out and Duggan grounded out. The Doyle went after Edwards in their session, starting the blow-up with Gross' single to right. Lee laid down a pretty sacrifice bunt which would have been an easy out but Wakefield was too anxious and when he went to take the ball his glove struck it and both runners were safe. This put Edwards in a bad hole. Parker sacrificed out, advancing Gross to third and Lee to second. Lynch sacrificed and Gross scored and Lee went to third. McPherson's red hot grounder ripped through Fryer's legs and Lee scored, tying up the game.

Neither side scored in the fourth, the pitchers sharing equal honors. In the Fredericton session of this round White tried to steal home from third on Lee's delivery but he was caught. Lee to Gross to Lynch. White when he went dodging between Gross and Lynch ran out of the base line.

Fredericton did not tally in their session of the fifth and they played in hard luck, Murphy throwing away a run by a peg to second when there was nobody there. After Lee was out Parker walked and started to steal second. Murphy threw the ball, as above recorded and Parker scored. Lynch fanned and McPherson grounded out; one run.

Neither side scored in the sixth or seventh.

The locals clinched the game in the eighth aided by a pitiful wild throw of Murphy. McPherson singled to left. Tetrault knocked down a sacrifice but Murphy picked it up and threw it to the coacher instead of at Wakefield. McPherson went to third and Tetrault to second. Pease sacrificed and Tetrault went to third, Jacobson sacrificed, scoring Tetrault. Vance singled to centre and Gross fled out; two runs.

Fredericton failed to count in the last time at bat and the game ended. The features of the game were the hitting of Jacobson, McPherson, Tetrault, Parker and Vance and the double play of Fryer and Callahan, the exceptionally fine pitching of Lee, who held them down to three hits with eight strikeouts to his credit. Lee's fast curves were breaking nice and he had the Fredericton staters at his mercy.
