## SUBURBANITES MAY HAVE ACT AMENDED

Promised Test Case Over Assessment Did Not Materialize--Provincial Secretary Said to Have Promised An Amendment Next Year

The test case under the City of Fredericton Assessment Act did not materialize as was expected. Mr. H. C. Rutter, as tax collector, paid a visit Friday evening to a resident of St. Mary's, who is employed in the city, and informed him that the city rates must be paid. Mr. Rutter was armed with an execution but advised a settlement, which was accordingly made.

This has been a mooted question for some time, the city claiming that residents of St. Mary's and Douglas employed in the city can be taxed on the full amount of their income, while the opposite contention to that act states "that any person having any occupation, etc., in the City of Fredericton shall be deemed to be taken to be and is hereby declared to be, an inhabitant and resident of the city and shall be assessed accordingly."

This section is claimed by the working men of Douglas and St. Mary's to let them in under any reservations or exemptions contained in the act.

There is an exemption under the act respecting incomes of residents which in effect states that they are exempt to the extent of three hundred dollars. There is a proviso, however, which reads that the section does not apply to non-residents. The proviso is claimed by residents of St. Mary's and Douglas to have no bearing in respect to them as they are "deemed to be taken and hereby declared to be, residents and inhabitants" under the act and any proviso with reference to non-residents would be a contradiction of terms.

The city authorities have been anxious to put the case to a test and have picked out two men, one living in Douglas and one in St. Mary's.

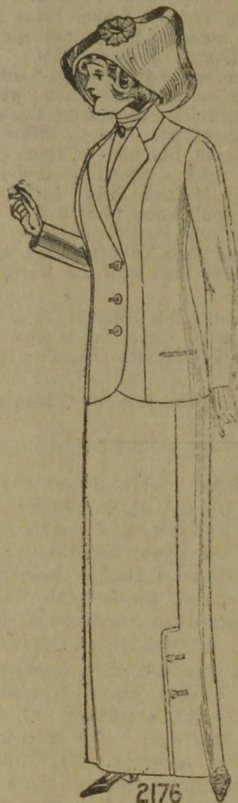

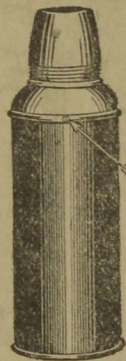
