SETTLEMENT REACHED

for \$1500 and they employed the war-
dens last year and issued permits to
sportsmen. Under the agreement with
the club the company will be allowed

REVISION OF BYLAWS
PRACTICALLY FINISHED
BY CITY COUNCIL

Special Meeting to be Held Next Week
---Bills for Legislature Recommended
to Council--Billboards to be
Licensed

The revision of the city bylaws is
now complete with the exception of
the bylaw relating to Miscellaneous
Licenses, which will be considered in
committee prior to a special meet-
ing of the City Council, which will
be held on Monday or Tuesday next.
That special meeting will be for the
purpose of passing the bills which
are to be presented to the legisla-
ture for enactment and also for
passing bylaws as revised.

MARKET BYLAW.

The council met in committee last
night and considered the bylaw re-
lating to markets and that relating
to bill-boards. The market bylaw
was passed almost in its existing
form, the only change of moment
being that giving the chief of police
the powers of market regulation,
etc., which formerly lay in the mar-
ket-clerk. The office of market clerk
no longer exists. Tolls are not to be
imposed, it not being deemed advisable
under existing circumstances to do
so.

BILL-BOARDS TO BE LICENSED.

With regard to bill-boards, a sec-
tion was placed in the bylaw by
which it is required that a resident
representative of any company con-
trolling a bill-board or an owner of a
bill-board must take out a yearly
license, the fee for which is to be
ten dollars. Some of those present
expressed the opinion that rates for
public bill-posting had been advanced
to such an extent since so-called
bill-posting companies had taken
control of the business in the city
that a much larger license-fee could
well be imposed. The sum mentioned
was finally decided upon, however.

DEBENTURE BILL RECOMMENDED

The members of the Committee on
Legislation met at the close of the
meeting of the committee of the
whole and took up the consideration
of the bill for a debenture issue to
be presented to the legislature which
had been referred back to that body
at the last regular meeting of the
City Council on account of objection
to a section providing for a deben-
ture issue for the erection of a police
station. The bill was recommended
to the City Council in its original
form. The section with regard to a
police station is considered as giving
power to any future council which may
consider it advisable to do so to
issue debentures to pay for the erec-
tion of such a building.

PROHIBITORY
LAW TO BE ASKED
OF GOVERNMENT

New Brunswick Branch, Dominion Al-
liance, Will Meet Here in Con-
vention February 25 and Make
That Request

The coming session of the provin-
cial legislature will see another re-
quest made of the provincial gov-
ernment for the enactment of a law
prohibiting the importation sale and
manufacture of liquor within the
province of New Brunswick. This de-
mand is to be made by the New
Brunswick Branch of the Dominion
Alliance which will meet in this city
in convention on Tuesday the 25th
inst.

TURNED DOWN BEFORE

A similar request was made of the
Hazen government a few years ago
and was refused. It is understood
that many members of the Alliance
believe that the request will meet
with a like reception but that it
will be shown that the temperance
sentiment is becoming stronger in the
province and that public opinion
back of the request for a prohibi-
tory law is increasing.

LARGE ATTENDANCE

The convention to be held here on
the 25th inst. will be the second
provincial branch of the Alliance.

The majority of the temperance
organization of the province will be
represented at the convention as will
also be many of the churches.
Three sessions are to be held, morn-
ing afternoon and evening. A large
attendance of delegates is expected.
Other matters besides those connect-
ed with temperance will come be-
fore the convention.

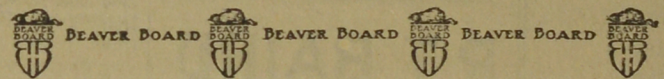
