


BLIND HYMN WRITER 95

BANK CLERK GETS FOUR YEARS

New York, March 19-William B. Trefry a young Nova Scotia bank cierk who startled the capitals of Europe by lavish expenditure of monty, was sentenced to Sing Sing prison for a term of not less than four years. He pleaded guilty to two indictments for forgeries by which he defrauded the local branch of the Royal Bank of Canada out of \$7000.

Trefry was employed in a branch of Trefry was employed in a branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia and more recently in Vancouver. Last January he obtained the \$7000 from the branch here by means of a forged credit transfer, ostensibly signed by the manager of the branch in Van-couver.
