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**WHO ARE THE REBELS?**

The Deputy Speaker of the House of Commons is Mr. P. E. Blondin, a Tory-Nationalist member who sits for Champlain, Quebec. During the bye-election campaign in Drummond Arthabaska, he gave utterance to the following gems of love, loyalty and good fellowship for England and English institutions:

"YOU ARE ATTEMPTING TO INTIMIDATE THE ELECTORATE BY SHAKING THE ENGLISH FLAG BEFORE IT AND BY SAYING THAT WE OUGHT TO CONTRIBUTE TO THE DEFENSE IN ALL PLACES AND AGAINST ALL PEOPLE OF THIS PROTECTOR (BRITAIN) OF OUR CONSTITUTIONAL LIBERTY, BUT WE WILL NOT BE MADE TO FORGET THAT IN 1837 IT WAS NECESSARY TO BORE HOLES IN THIS FLAG WITH BULLETS IN ORDER TO BREATHE THE AIR OF LIBERTY. . . . WE OWE NOTHING TO BRITAIN, ENGLAND DID NOT TAKE CANADA FOR LOVE OR TO PLANT THE CROSS OF CHRIST AS THE FRENCH DID, BUT IN ORDER TO PLANT THEIR TRADING POSTS AND MAKE MONEY. THE ONLY LIBERTIES WE HAVE ARE THOSE WE HAVE WON BY FORCE, AND TODAY ENGLAND TRIES TO DOMINATE HER COLONIES AS IMPERIAL ROME ONCE DID. . . . THOSE WHO DISEMBOWELLED OUR FATHERS ON THE PLAINS OF ABRAHAM ARE ASKING YOU TODAY TO GO AND GET KILLED FOR THEM. WE HAVE HAD ENOUGH BOTH OF ENGLAND AND THE ENGLISH."

This is the man who was honored by the party in parliament, the member of which during the naval debate hurled the words "traitor," "rebel" and similar epithets across the floor at their Liberal opponents. This is the man who has been busy ruling in favor of Tory back benches on points of order raised during the naval debate.

**CHURCHILL REBUKED**

The Nation, the foremost English weekly Liberal review, lectures Winston Churchill over the Canadian naval question. It declares that the friction aroused is the most serious that has occurred in our later relationship with the self-governing colonies, and continues:

"We hope that Mr. Churchill will take this grave matter to heart. Ships were never really wanted and even if they were the admiralty knew well that acute differences existed between the Liberal and Conservative view as to how they should be built and maintained. That being so, it was our business to stand from under Canadian Liberals are as much aggrieved at this blow from a Liberal minister as the innocent passer-by would be if the sentry at Buckingham Palace suddenly drove a bayonet through his body."

The Spectator highly praises Premier Borden's attitude under attack and blames Mr. Churchill:

"Mr. Churchill has a positive genius for saying the right thing in the wrong way. With other statesmen this prolixity is emollient, with him it is irritant."

The St. John Standard, in a lengthy article reviewing the work of the recent session of the Legislature, says: "Some amendments are made in the Provincial Hospital Act. The province has been paying for the support of dangerous pauper lunatics, and the municipalities have paid \$1.25 per week for the maintenance of the ordinary pauper lunatics. After January 1st, 1914, the expense of all pauper lunatics, without distinction, will be chargeable on the municipality in which they have obtained a legal settlement at the rate of \$1.00 per week for each pauper lunatic in the hospital." This means that the City of Fredericton and Municipality of York in 1914 will pay for the support of the Provincial Hospital \$1,700 more than they paid during the year 1912 and the money will have to be raised by direct taxation. This is what Mr. Pinder and other Tory politicians used to call "unloading burdens" on the municipalities.

The government bond guarantee to the Southampton Railway having been increased by \$2,000 per mile, now amounts to \$12,000. As the road is thirteen miles in length, this makes a total of \$156,000 which the province has invested in the undertaking. The C.P.R. is to lease and operate the road and pay to the government forty per cent. of the gross earnings. As the interest on the bonds amounts to \$6,240 annually, this means that in order to recoup the government for the interest on the bonds the road will have to earn \$14,976 per year.

Emile Bourassa is by Sir Wilfrid Laurier regarded as "a perjurer or a personator, perhaps both." And it was to Emile Bourassa that his kinsman, the Hon. One of the largest shippers of produce in this section told The Mail on Saturday that he had purchased a car-load of potatoes for shipment for fifty cents a barrel. In view of the statement so frequently made by Tory flag-flappers during the federal campaign of 1911, that "the Fredericton market is the best in Canada" it is remarkably strange that farmers can be found willing to accept fifty cents per barrel for potatoes for shipment abroad.
