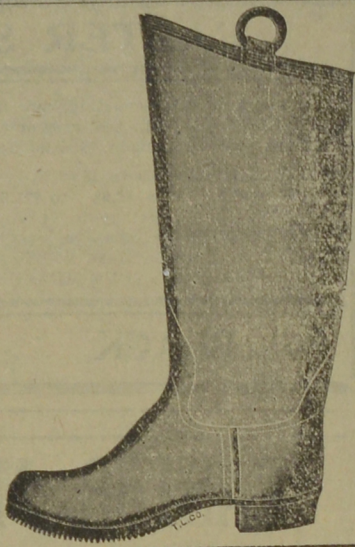
NAVIGATION MATTERS

CHILD DROVE PENKNIFE INTO HER RIGHT EYE

Little Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. R. Hanson of Gibson May Lose Sight---Baby Severely Scalded

Isabella, the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. David R. Hanson of Gibson, suffered a very severe accident on Thursday afternoon last when she drove the blade of a pen-knife into the ball of her right eye. Dr. G. C. VanWart was called to examine the child and attend to the injury. He stated that it will be several days before it can definitely be said whether or not the sight of the eye has been destroyed.

The child, who is about three years of age, was at the home of her grandmother, Mrs. Brown, a short distance from her own home. She was playing with the knife, cutting at some vines which were growing on the side of the house. How she happened to pierce her eye with the blade is unknown.

CHILD SEVERELY SCALDED.

Saturday night a child named McFadden, about a year old, suffered severe burns about the limbs and lower part of the body at the home of her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J. Smith of Barker's Point. The little one was creeping about on the kitchen-floor and pulled over on herself a pot filled with hot food for hogs which had just been taken from the stove. She was horribly burned. The doctor in attendance however, thinks she will recover, although the healing will not be rapid.

WILLIAM KIELEY OF KINGSCLEAR HURT IN DYNAMITE EXPLOSION

Rock Struck Him on Head Cutting it Severely---Delirious for Some Time But is Now Improving

William Kieley, son of Clarence R. Kieley of Kingsclear, and brother of James Kieley of Fredericton, was seriously injured in a dynamite explosion at Kieley's Rock, some fifteen miles west of this city, Friday night, during blasting operations on Smith & Merrithew's contract. He was struck on the head by a large rock and his head split from the crown downward. Medical aid was summoned and his injury attended to. Kieley was delirious for some hours. Today he is reported to be resting much easier.

The injured young man, who is well known throughout this section of the country, was a member of the night gang which was blasting at that point, which is not far from the Kieley home. When the blast which injured him was set off he neglected to stand far enough away from it and consequently was struck by a falling rock.

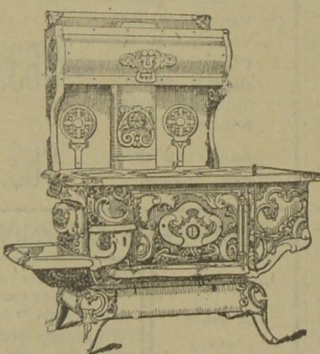
