"The new legislation touching the of the Provincial Lunatic Asylum, which imposes an additional direct tax of \$17,000 per annum on the municipalities, is perhaps one of the worst features of the work of the session. With an ever-increasing yearly revenue, of which we have beard so much boasting, there certainly was no need or call for the tainly was no need or call for the placing of such a burden upon the people. How often have we heard the premier and his following, whe in opposition, cry out against wha they were pleased to term the sys tem of direct taxation at times ar parent under the old administration What reason or excuse can they no give for such a radical departu from their pledges of the past? The cannot attribute it to the Uncrease cost of maintenance of this instit tion, because the provincial secretary, in his budget speech, waxe most eloquent in claiming credit for the fact that the asylum, under the present regime, cost from \$5 to \$ per head per year less than ever b The only reason can be foun in that inordinate desire of all con servative governments to make people bear all the direct taxation possible."

This latest raid on the municipa ties cannot be justified on any posible grounds, and so far as we as aware, not a single pap-fed newspa per supporting the government has made the slightest attempt to defen it. It is a hold-up pure and simple at the expense of the already ove burdened taxpayers of this province. Premier Flamming is the man who introduced this bill in the legislature and it was passed with almost light ring rapidity. True, some of th back-benchers kicked against it i caucus, but when it came to a show down before the House, they were a mute as the harp that once thru Tara's halls. They were also silen when the bill was passed increasing the salary of the premier by \$2,400 and that of the hon. doctor of agr culture by \$400.

As the Transcript's correspondent tersely puts it:

"All the principles of economy preached while in opposition seem to have disappeared from the 'make-up of our present rulers. It is no won der that, following the example se by the premier, his followers in the House made an attempt to have their indemnity increased. They felt they had as much right to an in-

crease as the premier.' The indemnity grab was staved off this session but the "boys" feel that they have as much right to share in the spoils as the premier, and they will be heard from again next year.
