the amounts listed in the books and accounts of the Treasury. In 1885, when the administration passed into hands of the Democratic party and a Democratic treasurer succeeded the former Republican incumbent, a deficit of 2 cents was found at the count, but the missing coppers were found behind one of the desks after a few days. A few years ago it was found at one of these counts that one \$1000 bill was missing. The treasurer made good the amount and was later on reimbursed by Congress.

Upon another occasion, a few years ago, one of the colored men employed at the count to carry coin bags from the vault to the weighing counter and back, stole about 600 silver-dollars from the bags, substituting for them lead pieces of the same weight as the silver dollars. He was detected, however, arrested and punished. The detection of the man's dishonesty made it necessary to open every single coin bag in the vaults and to verify their contents by actual count.

The committee entrusted with the task of the count consists of the chief of the public moneys division, the chief of the loans and currency division and personal representatives of the retiring and the incoming treasurer. The vaults were turned over to the committee today and carefully closed and sealed. The contents of the vaults will not be disturbed during the count excepting for the purpose of counting the funds. Only enough money to keep the wheels of the government revolving has been kept apart for use while the count is in progress. The vaults will be sealed at the close of every workday and will not be removed until the count is completed and the new treasurer ready to hand his receipt to predecessor in office. When Carmi Thompson succeeded Lee McClung as treasurer he received more than \$1,400,000.00. He must account for every cent of that amount, plus the millions he has received, minus expenditures.

take up his residence, to use the words of the statute, Mr. Fredericton that his wife and family should go with him, it is clear that she has not gone. Under what circumstances she has remained we do not know. Neither do I think it important, for there can be no doubt a man can take up a separate residence and the exigencies of one's business or occupation often render it necessary. The question here is whether the Sheriff has done so as to render him liable to the taxation. In my opinion he has. I am at a loss to see what additional act or what omission on his part can be suggested as necessary under his circumstances to make him a resident.

If I should be wrong in the view I have expressed, I think the applicant would be liable to be assessed on his entire income as a non-resident under section 34 and would be free of a poll tax. The necessity for his keeping an office at Fredericton and the fact that he does keep it are admitted but it is contended that he is within the exemption mentioned in section 3 (11), which enacts that "incomes of non-residents, being members of the executive government of the province or non-residents, em-

out in force in the vicinity of the Morgan home and at one time reached such proportions that it was necessary to request the police to disperse them.

The immediate effect on the machinery of Wall Street of Mr. Morgan's death was comparatively slight. On the stock exchange the news from Rome had largely spent its force within fifteen minutes after the opening of the market. Mr. Morgan's illness had prepared the financial district for the end and every precaution had been taken to guard against a serious break in prices. At the opening the prominent stocks declined a point or so, but they received prompt support and rallied quickly. Thereafter the market was full.

## WALL STREET MOURNS

Wall Street's relations with the head of the house of Morgan had been of such a large consequence for so many years that the news of the passing of the senior partner made an enormous impression. From bankers, brokers, railroad and business men came tributes to the dead man.

Outside the Morgan offices there was a curious crowd for some time after the news was received. On the glass door of the building was a terse notice that the offices would be closed for the day. Friends of Mr. Morgan pointed out another reason in addition to the warning given by his illness why the financier's death was not seriously disturbing. His career they said was rounded out. It had accomplished virtually all it had started out to achieve. For some time the Morgan firm refrained from large new enterprises. All that human foresight could dictate had been done during the last year or two to safeguard the business and financial world against calamity when Mr. Morgan's last hour came.

Among the numerous appreciations of Mr. Morgan, was one by Robert H. Gary, chairman of the board of directors of the United States Steel Corporation, the greatest of all the industries organized by Mr. Morgan.

"None of Mr. Morgan's business associates will mourn his death more than those who are connected with the United States Steel Corporation," said Mr. Gary. "His presence his counsel, his efforts were always influential in the endeavor to establish and maintain a reputation for fair and honorable treatment toward all who might be affected by the decisions and conduct of the corporation. His death will leave a void that can never be filled."

## SON LIKE FATHER.

Nothing is known as yet as to how Mr. Morgan in his will disposed of his vast estate. J. Pierpont Morgan Jr., has been his father's understudy for years and is classed high in financial ability. He served his apprenticeship in the London house of Morgan, Grenfell & Company. He is in the forties and greatly resembles his father in facial detail, build and manner of walking. Like his father, he is quick at reaching a determination on big questions, brusque and intolerant of small details. His preparation to take his father's place in the business world has been thoroughly worked out.

## GAVE AWAY MANY MILLIONS.

The extent of Morgan's philanthropic gifts probably will never be known. He gave unostentatiously—impulsively rather than along the lines of a fixed campaign. Probably his largest gift was \$4,500,000 toward the building of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in this city. For the founding of the great lying-in-hospital near St. George's church, of which Mr. Morgan was a warder he donated \$1,350,000. Harvard benefited by his munificence to the extent of \$1,500,000, with which was built the medical school in Boston. Trinity College was given \$250,000 for a library.

If the accounts of Mr. Morgan could be seen, it is said, they would disclose the names of numerous persons whose fortunes, lost in investments in Morgan securities, were returned to them. Notable among them, it is stated, would be the name of a noted jurist, who, after he had ceased active work, lost all his investments made, as he supposed, on the advice of Mr. Morgan.

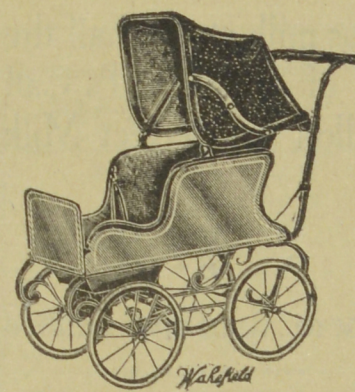

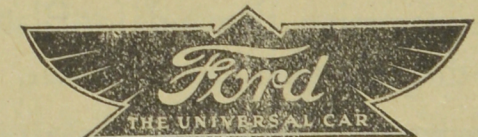
