MARYSVILLE

Cotton Mill to Work Shorter Hours in
Future--Several Brick Dwelling
Houses to be Erected

Marysville, April 18--Beginning on Monday, April 28th the Cotton Mill will start at 6.40 a.m., instead of 6.45 as at present and on the following Saturday, May 3rd will close at twelve o'clock noon, thus giving the employees Saturday afternoon. The plant will work 57 hours a week instead of sixty which it is now doing thus giving the operatives working by the day three hours off during the week. It is expected that those who do piece work such as the weaver-room hands and mule spinners will get off as much production in the fifty seven hours as they formerly got in the sixty. At that rate the half holiday movement will practically mean a slight raise in wages for the help. It is understood that the train will make a special trip from Marysville to Fredericton shortly after twelve o'clock Saturday in order to convey those working in the mill and living in Gibson and this city to their homes.

The movement for shorter hours has been talked of for some time by the cotton mill hands. It is a good idea and will give those employed there a chance to take a half-day's outing from the care and wear of indoor life.

It is rumored that Mr. Fred Ryan of Fredericton is soon to erect a large number of brick houses on the eastern side of the river, for the cotton mill employees. With the new machinery already installed in the mill and with what is expected to be set up, it will be necessary to employ more people in order to successfully operate the different departments. Some new houses will have to be erected in order to accommodate the people which will likely move here.

That the fox farm craze has struck Marysville was proved a few days ago in the cotton mill, when one of the office staff chased an "English fox" out of the office, but in doing so the fox upset him before getting away. An English fox is something different from the Silver Black, Red or Gray fox, although like the latter is rather rare, and one would think mighty bold as he wandered into the cotton mill office without being observed.

The many friends of Postmaster James Inch will be pleased to hear that he is much better and rapidly recovering from his recent illness.

Mr. William Cameron who has been suffering from "grippe" is also improving. His numerous friends are glad to see him out again.

There was a large attendance of the members of Marysville Lodge Knights of Pythias at their regular meeting last night on which occasion a brother was advanced to the second rank of the order with the usual pomp and ceremony.

During the evening a committee was appointed to get up a degree team to work the long form. The idea is an excellent one and should be carried out as this degree is very pretty and impressive.

THE POPE IS IMPROVING

Cardinal Merry Del Val, the papal secretary of state, visited the Pope this afternoon and having first obtained permission from the doctors, submitted for his signature several decrees on important questions of an urgent character. Pope Pius signed them and his handwriting was firm and clear and showed no change from his writing before his illness.

The deep concern of the Italian government in the illness of the Pope was manifested today when a request was made to those in charge of the case for a statement regarding the prognosis. This was met with the declaration that it was practically impossible to say whether the pontiff would recover but if he did his condition hereafter might be considered precarious.

In spite of the official reports there are reports emanating from there are reports emanating from other sources that the Pope is suffering from arterio sclerosis and a variety of other diseases, but the doctors emphatically deny this.

New N. Y., April 18--The market was dull and a little heavy although on the whole stocks were not greatly affected by disappointing result of St. Paul bond sale. Initial declines were confined to comparatively small fractions and stocks were supported at about their opening level.

Though traders were very pessimistic about St. Paul bond, matter alleging that new financing hereafter could only be accomplished by greatest difficulty, any selling of the stock was absorbed and after the recession prices hardened. At the end of the first half hour, stocks seemed to possess a good undertone.

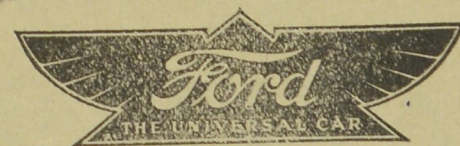
