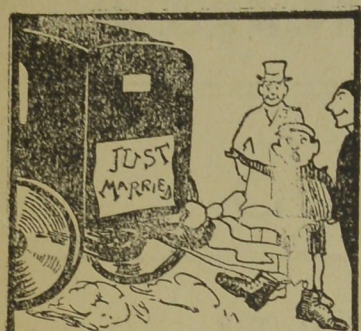

THE TELEPHONE AND ITS ABUSES IN VICTORIA CO.

Subscriber—"Hello Central! Give me 99-1."

Central—"Line busy."

Subscriber, five minutes later—"Hello Central! Give me 99-1."

Central—"Line busy."

Subscriber, ten minutes later—"Central, can I get 99-1 now?"

Central—"One moment. Line still busy."

Subscriber—"Central, give me 2-15."

Central—"Line busy."

Subscriber—"Say, Central, what's the matter? Can't I get anybody this morning?"

Central—"I told you 'Line busy.'"

Subscriber grows impatient and calls up a number on his own line to transact some important business.

Takes down receiver and hears Mrs. B and Mrs. S talking. He then hangs up receiver and waits five to ten minutes and then goes back and rings again, takes down receiver and to his surprise Mrs. B and Mrs. S are still talking and he hears the following conversation:

"Do you think so? I think it is just lovely. You know it is something new and I rather like it because it came from Eaton's. What color? Oh, it is deep orange and lavender with a plait double furrowed, double stitched with a band of brocade silk down the front and just matches my hat. Oh, I liked the dance very much but was awfully tired this morning and could scarcely get out my washing, our baby, you know, is cutting teeth and John went to the mill this morning and left me to feed the chickens, but I don't mind that for our hens are just shelling out the eggs now and they are twenty-eight cents a dozen. Say, you can get those lovely seeded raisins at Eaton's eleven cents a package."

And so the conversation went on and on from one thing to another until the subscriber became disgusted and tried to ring them off. Mrs. B and Mrs. S both then made an attack upon him for ringing in to interrupt them.

The subscriber then starts an investigation and learns that 99-1 and line 2-15 were in use at that time in very much the same way as the conversation he heard on his own line. The subscriber could have transacted his business on the three lines in less than three minutes had he been permitted the use of the line.

Telephones are very useful and the writer of this has nothing at all against the ladies gossiping over the line but feels that they should use some judgment and have a little feeling for the rights of those who must use the line for the transaction of business.

And then again there is too much use made of the line by those who are afflicted with that most loathsome dishonest disease called the "rubber ear." Now this is the really dangerous individual. The individual who will drop all other household duties and run to the 'phone to find out somebody's business, I say the person who will do this thing is a very dangerous, very dishonest and the meanest and most contemptible of all the human race. If they would listen and keep what they heard to themselves it would not be quite so bad but that it is impossible for the listener who is afflicted with that dishonest "rubber ear" to hold their tongues still, goes without saying. There have been cases within the bounds of Victoria County and within the past three months, where business men have been deprived of the privilege of concluding legitimate transaction by reason of the exposure and publicity given out by these "rubber eared" hypocrites. A conversation over the telephone belongs to the two persons or more engaged in the conversation just as much as the letter written by Mr. B to Mr. A. The party who opens a letter, breaks the seal, is a criminal. Is the party who listens to a telephone conversation any less?

The writer does not want to say that all listeners are criminals because sometimes one may hear innocently part of a conversation when he takes down a receiver for business which is interesting to him, such as the serious illness of some friend, the death of some friend or news which is in part public news, and in cases of this kind he may be tempted to hang to the receiver to hear news along these lines but the honorable man or woman will not for one moment attempt to pick up business or conversation which in no way affects them.

Let us have honor among telephone subscribers.

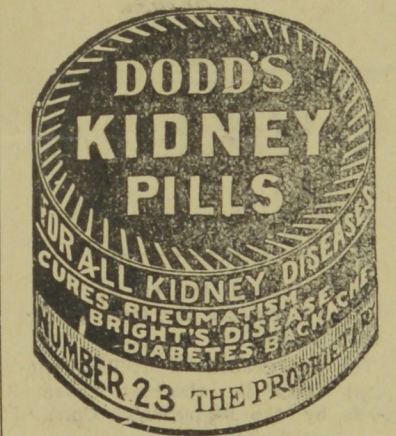
