St. John, June 16—The record crowd of 2,500 fans witnessed the best exhibition of baseball seen on the local grounds this season when the Fredericton team defeated the Marathons Saturday afternoon by the score of 5 to 4.

The contest was replete with critical moments and sensational plays and sharp work by both sides brought the rooters up time after time as the players, going in mid-season form, showed speed in fielding and base running that made the holiday event a battle that will greatly increase the interest in the league.

A pleasing feature of the exhibition was absence of unnecessary kicking, and although one questionable decision in the eighth went against the locals and practically won the game for Fredericton, the Marathons set a good example by refraining from argument.

BANGOR WON AGAIN.

Bangor, Me., June 14—Bangor took the second game from St. Croix today by a score of 6 to 3. Wallace, a new pitcher, was very effective, allowing but six hits, three of which were made in the last three innings. Howard pitched a good game for St. Croix, but Bangor bunched their hits at the right time and got an early lead. A strong east wind blew across the field made it very hard for the men in the outer garden to judge high hit balls.

In the first, Bangor scored two runs, singles by Perry and Mayo, a life given to Lebrun by being hit by Howard and Tewhey's two-base hit netted them two runs.

There was nothing doing in the run line for St. Croix until the sixth. A three-base hit by Parker and an error on McPherson's hit gave them their first run. The home team scored two more in the third. A base on balls to Mayo and singles by Hammond and Swazey put them across. St. Croix came across with one more
