## BOY BROKE HIS LEG

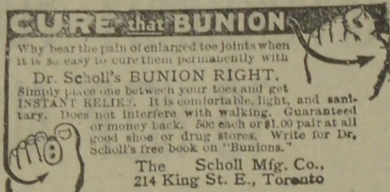

## MINISTER OF RAILWAYS MAY BE HERE TUESDAY

Valley Railway Matters to be Discussed—Rumored That C.P.R. Station Will be Used by St. John & Quebec Railway

The Minister of Railways and Canals, accompanied by Mr. Gutelius, general manager of the Intercolonial Railway of Canada, and other I.R.C. officials, according to current report, are to be here tomorrow on a tour of inspection. The local I.R.C. representatives have received no word, however, that the minister, Hon. Mr. Cochrane, and his party will be here Tuesday, but it is expected that the visit to Fredericton will be made some day this week, the party being at Halifax Saturday.

## VALLEY RAILWAY MATTERS.

MacNeill, formerly of Keswick Ridge, York County, and at one time chairman of the County Board of Health, is to be medical superintendent of the new insane asylum now being erected by the government of Saskatchewan at Battleford in that province. The position is a most important one and carries with it a free residence in addition to a substantial salary.

Dr. MacNeill, who has been making a tour of the United States, inspecting asylums for the insane, arrived here last week to join Mrs. MacNeill, who has been for several weeks the guest of her father, Mr. John A. Campbell, ex-M.P.P., of Kingsclear. It is his intention to leave shortly for the Old Country, where he will

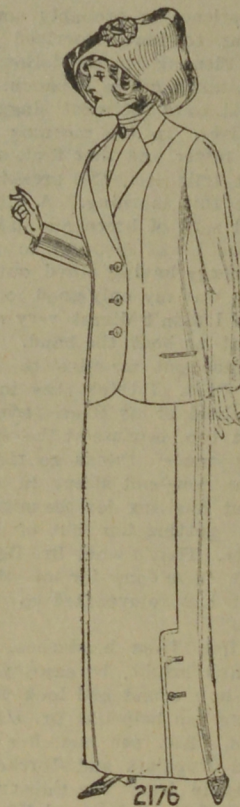

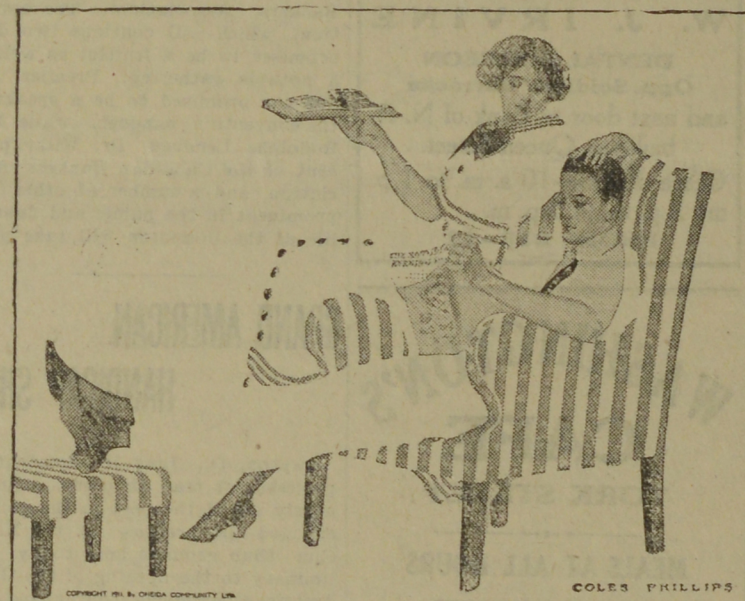
