## EX-PROV. CONSTABLES BEFORE THE COURT

Hopewell Hill, March 28—Judge Landry will preside at the April session of the Albert circuit court, which opens at the Cape next Tuesday, April 1. The docket, which is expected to be made up entirely of criminal matters, will include two cases against G. H. Prosser, ex-provincial constable, charged with breaking and entering a store in which he is charged with the theft of a cow; also a second trial of the Colpitts case, in which the jury disagreed at the September sitting. In the latter case, the defendant John W. Colpitts, also an ex-provincial constable, in charge with perjury in connection with the late provincial election, in taking the residence oath at the Coverdale polling booth, the prosecution claiming he was a resident of Moncton at the time. George W. Fowler, M. P., who defended Colpitts at the former trial, will defend in all three cases. Hon. Mr. Giesmer, attorney-general will represent the crown.

## CONFERENCE OF MIND EXPERTS

Boston, Mass., March 31—Many of the best known educators in the country are taking part in a conference which opened in Tremont Temple today for the discussion of nervous and mental disorders and all the problems connected with them. Among those scheduled to deliver addresses during the week are Dr. Charles Elliot of Harvard University; President G. Stanley Hall of Clark University; Professor Stewart Paton of Princeton, and Dr. Thomas W. Salmon of New York, director of the national committee for mental hygiene.

Norfolk, Va., March 31—The season of racing in the East was inaugurated here today when the gates at the Jamestown Jockey Club's track were opened for the annual spring meeting. ## RAILWAY UNIONS IN A MERGER

London, March 29—The National Union of Railwaymen, which came into existence today through the merger of the Amalgamated Society of Railway Servants, the United Pointsmen and Signalmen's Society and the General Railway Workers' Union, is the largest labor union in the United Kingdom, and probably the largest in the world, its membership being 18,000 and its resources \$2,300,000.

The amalgamation of the several societies into one organization is the first instance of any trade union adopting the syndicalist idea of a union covering all sections of an industry, in preference to the old system of organization by craft or trade. The principal object, is of course, to make it possible for the new society to call out practically every person in the employ of railway companies in the event of a strike.

The funeral of the late Mr. Peter J. King, who died recently, took place from his home at Hanwell on Thursday last and was largely attended. An impressive service was conducted at the R. C. Church by Rev. Father Cormier. The deceased was a young man of many excellent qualities and his untimely death is much regretted. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. M. King, two brothers, Donald of Hanwell and J. L. of Missoula, Mont. Mayor Gross of Moncton has been served with an order issued by Judge White calling upon him to appear before the Supreme Court at Fredericton on April 8th to show cause why an information in the nature of a writ quo warranto should not issue against him to show by what authority he holds office as mayor of Moncton. The proceedings have been instituted by Mr. Patrick Gallagher who has engaged Mr. J. G. Sherran as counsel. It is claimed that the mayor is the lessee of a stall in the city market.

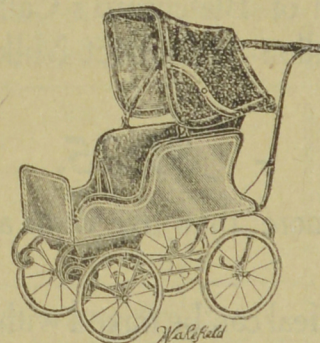

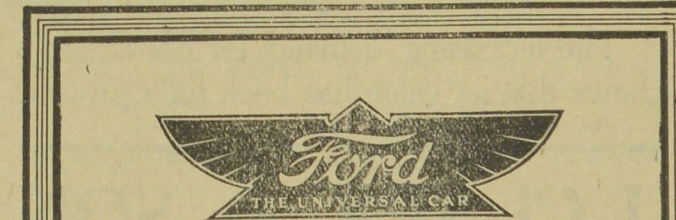
