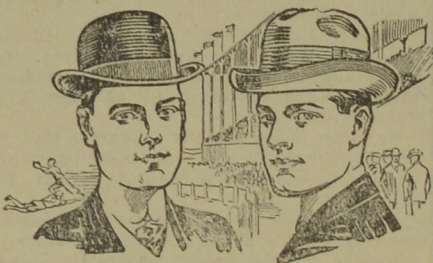

EMMETT QUINN

AFTER OFFENDERS AGAINST N. H. A. RULES

Lalonde and Fred Lake Charged With
Playing in International League
Series at the Soo

President Emmett Quinn of the National Hockey Association, is after the players who competed in the International League Series at the American Soo a couple of weeks ago. Fred Lake, of Ottawa, and Newsy Lalonde of the Canadiens, are said to be the ones who will be expelled.

The constitution of the N. H. A. states that no club or player can participate in a game outside the league before, during or after the scheduled season without permission being first given by the president. President Quinn avers that neither Lake nor Lalonde received the necessary permission to play in New Ontario, and are subject to suspension and expulsion.

The N.H.A. executive head, however, has no absolute proof that either Lake or Lalonde took part in any games in the International League, and only has newspaper talk to work upon. However, President Quinn was investigating the matter and will call upon the erring players for an explanation if the reports proved to be true. H.

FIRST OFFICIAL SCORER

HAS PASSED AWAY

New York, N. Y., March 29—William H. Rankin, said to have been the first official baseball scorer died suddenly from acute indigestion today in Brooklyn, aged 64 years. Rankin was a semi-professional in the early days of baseball, followed the game closely as a writer for various publications and acquired a considerable reputation as an authority on the sport. He had been connected with the New York Clipper for the past thirty years, closely associated with the late Henry Chadwick.

Billy Papke, George Gunther and Tom Leavy evidently do not box according to the standard set by the French Boxing Federation, as that body has suspended the trio until next December.

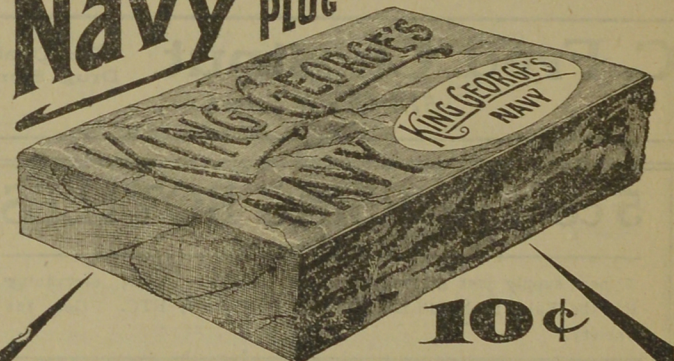
CLEVELAND TO

CHANGE SYSTEM OF BALL-PLAYING

More Team Work Will be Attempted
---Too Much Individual Playing in
Past Spoiled Naps

From Cleveland comes the news that the American League team of that city is going to change its style and essay regular major baseball. Cleveland has had a career strangely like that of Brooklyn in 1912 in some respects. An examination of the dope at the end of the campaign every year shows that the Naps have hit well, fielded well, and finished nowhere! We cannot call to mind any other team which has accumulated such enticing figures and produced so few results except Brooklyn in 1912. Some excuse could be found for Brooklyn last year on the ground that it sent on the field not infrequently a combination in which were six men fresh from the minors, and Otto Miller who had formerly been considered a third string catcher, but Cleveland has had a team of corking good individual veterans well accustomed to one another's methods. That the team had inherent strength was proved by the remarkable jump upward it made when George Stovall succeeded Jim McGuire as manager in 1911 and the improvement shown when Joe Birmingham stepped into the shoes of Harry Davis last year. Birmingham thinks that the fault has been that the Naps have been playing it individually and have not paid the proper attention to team work in batting. He is going to put a damper on the .300 hitting, insist upon the hit and run, the sacrifice, swinging at the first ball when the opposing pitcher shows signs of distress, and so on. It will be worth while noting how his miffed batting pans out compared with the hit-'er-ami stuff which has always been the Naps long suit.
