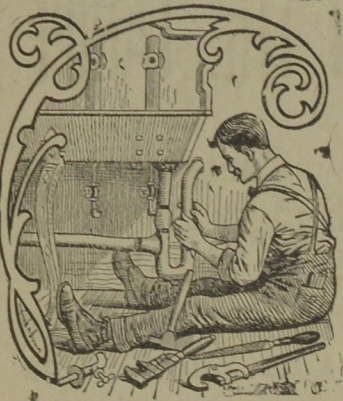

J. M. ROBINSON & SONS WEEKLY STOCK MARKET REVUE

St. John May 23—Three particularly notable events which have occurred during the last few days indicate most distinctly the trend of monetary conditions and the indication is that the turn has come.

The events to which we refer are the placing by the City of Philadelphia of its entire issue of 4 p.c. bonds at par. This was done by direct sale by the City to the individual investor, and while regarded in the light of an experiment was a notable success. The second was the over-subscription of the New York City issue of 4½ p.c. bonds, and the third the over-subscription of the Chinese loan.

These following close on the heels of unsuccessful flotations particularly in London, where for some time back the underwriters have been left with from 80 p.c. to 90 p.c. of the issues on their hands, indicates nothing more than that the time of extremely tight money has past, that a better feeling is abroad and that the turn for the better in the bond market has taken place. It is a notable fact that at the close of extended periods of financial depression the bond market is the first to turn and that we can now look forward to a considerable betterment in both the demand and the prices of all classes of securities.

This fact will in all probability be more noticeable in the American than in the Canadian market as the latter has not declined to the same extent as its larger neighbor nor has the monetary stringency been so noticeable, while the depression in the American market has extended over a good many months and has carried a great many stocks to their low levels. It will, however, be most noticeable in Canadian Pacific which being an international stock and being in an exceptionally strong financial position will respond readily to any betterment in conditions.

We note that this Company is advertising its desire to retire the \$35,000,000 of 5 p.c. bonds which are due to mature in 1915, and reference to the Company's financial statement shows that when once this issue of bonds is out of the way, as is practically now the case, there will be outstanding only \$4,690,000 of bonds and equipment obligations against the whole concern. There are small issues of preferred 4 p.c. and non-cumulative preferred stock and of Consolidated Perpetual debenture 4 p.c. stock but outside of this there is nothing except the common stock of the Company, and this condition in a large measure accounts for the high value placed on the security and on the readiness with which it responds to any betterment in the conditions. It is quite conceivable that with a slightly easier money market and the better political feeling all over the world, there will be an extended advance this year.

So far as the Canadian industries are concerned all are operating to their full capacity. The April output for the Dominion Iron and Steel Company has been exceptionally satisfactory, and indicates plenty of activity in that concern. The Dunlop Tire & Rubber Goods Company has increased its capital from \$993,000 to \$1,300,000 by the issue of additional preference stock. The Western Canada Flour Mills has acquired the assets and good will of Brackman Ker Milling Company in Alberta and British Columbia, it is reported that the price is in the vicinity of \$1,000,000.

MONEY.

There is no change in the money market except that conditions are a little easier due to an accumulation of money at the principal centres. Another \$2,000,000 of gold has been engaged in New York for shipment to Paris, making a total of \$12,000,000 taken for Paris on this movement and \$58,085,000 engaged for export this year up to the present.

The London Bank rate remains unchanged and the Canadian market is without feature, the banks holding on to all the supply of money possible and continuing their policy of curtailing credits.

MONTREAL.

In our own market there has been in some stocks advances and reactions have occurred but in practically every instance the volume of trading has been so small that no significance could be attached to the movement in prices. Among the stocks which moved up was Toronto Railway, which on Thursday advanced to 145½ on comparatively small transactions. There was no particular reason ascribed for the advance and it was confined to the morning session, the afternoon transactions being of no account whatever. This it merely an instance of what is likely to occur for some time. There will be short-lived flurries in this stock or that and on these flurries we would be inclined to sell for the present, buying back on the subsequent reaction, as it is quite likely that the monetary doldrums into which the whole Dominion has drifted during the past few months will not be very easy to steer away from, and if this is true we shall not see very much in the way of a bull market.

The question which seems most difficult to answer at the present time is in regard to the stability of the dividend on Dominion Steel Common and the return of President Plummer from England is eagerly awaited, as he will in all probability make some statement or other, in connection with the financial policy of the company. While we do not look for any cut in the present disbursement it will be very reassuring to hear what the president will have to say if he makes a statement for publication.

In summing up the whole situation we can only say that Montreal stocks are comparatively cheap, not on the bargain counter by any means, but on a basis where the good ones can be bought for investment purposes with the certainty that in addition to the liberal yield there will be a good opportunity to realize a profit before very long.

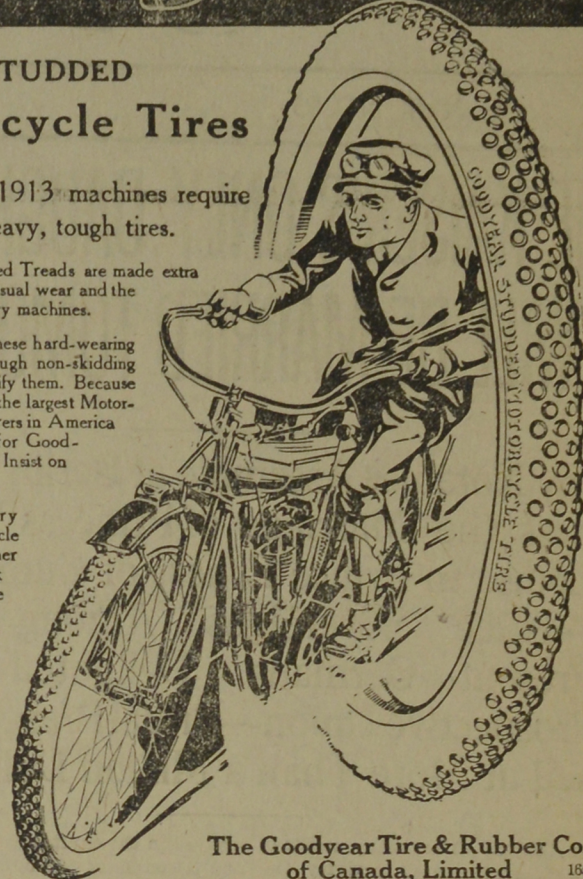

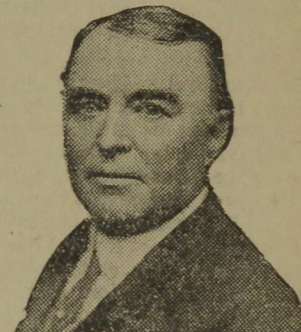
