It is far more desirable in the interest of the party that the subscriptions should be general, coming from every parish in the province, in other words, that there should be a large number of subscribers for small amounts rather than a small number of subscribers for large amounts.

Subscriptions for any amount from one dollar and upwards will be received by those in the different polling districts in the parishes who are authorized to do so, as well as by the County Treasurers, who will forward all amounts they receive directly, as well as those from parish collectors, to the Provincial Treasurer who will acknowledge the same.

The funds collected will be expended under the direction of the undersigned Provincial Committee representing the Liberal members from New Brunswick in the House of Commons and subject to the audit of Henry E. Hill, of St. Stephen.

This arrangement will bring to a most felicitous ending the feud between the Hohenzollern and the Geulphs which for more than fifty years has caused a great deal of friction in European politics and has greatly complicated the political relations bet ween Germany and England. The fued dates back to the time of George I., who, when succeeded to the English throne was both Duke of Brunswick-Lueneburg and King of Hanover. At that time there was no German Empire, and the Duchy and the Kingdom were independent States in which their rulers held large property and revenue rights. There was another house of Brunswick-Wolfenbucttel, which terminated, however in 1844 by the death of the last Duke, William, Duke of Brunswick. The Dukedom was then, claimed by the house of Brunswick-Lucneburg. which is now represented by Dulge Ernest August, Duke of Cumberland. Political complications caused the German Emperor to oppose the succession of the Duke of Cumberland to the title of King of Hanover and to the enjoyment of toe possesson of the Duke of Brunswick. All efforts of medition by the late King Edward proved without avail and it will remove a great deal of ill feeling and bitterness if the young Prince is, restored tol the title and possessions denie? to his


