THE NAVAL DEBATE

(Continued from page 1)

"A Canadian navy is no bugaboo to me," he declared. "I spoke in favor of it in 1909 and I have not changed my mind. I hope that the policy of the government will develop along that line."

He was willing to adopt a policy of conscription if such were necessary.

Mr. MacLean concluded by urging the parties to get together. A policy of contribution for dreadnoughts could be linked with an organization of a Canadian navy. The united voice of British Columbia was for a Canadian sea power to guard against Asiatic dangers.

"There has been a good deal of stumbling on both sides," said he. "It is not thirty-five millions; it is not dreadnoughts. You can pick holes in it in every way. It's a declaration of faith."

MR. TURGEON

Mr. Turgeon of Gloucester, N. B., declared that the Laurier naval policy was the best for the empire, the best for Canada and very much the best for the Province of New Brunswick, especially the North Shore and the city of St. John. If the Laurier policy had been adopted there would now be a shipyard in the city of St. John and the firm of Cammel, Laird & Co., would be about ready to launch the first of the war vessels there and hand them over to the minister of naval defence.

Though a St. John man, Mr. Hazen, it seemed, did not want to have this program carried out for he had refused the offer of the great British shipbuilders and there was now no shipbuilding industry in sight for St. John or for any other city of Canada. The establishment of shipbuilding at St. John would have been a great thing for the County of Gloucester, where there were immense iron deposits being developed.

Mr. Turgeon adjourned the debate and will continue his speech upon the navy when the house resumes the discussion on Tuesday.


