While on the line of donations Ald. Clark and Mr. J. F. McMurray presented their final report on the contributions received toward the cost of the X-Ray plant. These gentlemen submitted a list of the names of all contributors as published below, and stated that a general canvass of the city was not made for they found it was not necessary. However, they stated that they were most cordially received by the contributors, all of whom seemed glad to be able to assist in any way to render the hospital increasingly effective. The response was most hearty and made the labor of the committee pleasant. The list shows \$8,290 contributed, while the cost of the machine, including expenses of expert, was \$11,256.35, showing a credit balance of \$33. However, the trustees are still responsible for upwards of \$200 in connection with the expense of installing the plant and natural contingencies. It is not likely that the friends of the hospital will require the trustees to take the amount from the current funds.

It having been found that in addition to the cost of the plant it was absolutely necessary to build a dark room in connection with the X-Ray plant, the way for construction of same was opened by the Ladies' Aid sending the secretary-treasurer a cheque for \$50 towards cost of the same.

In making his report for the committee Ald. Clark referred to the general expression of appreciation from citizens respecting the work of the hospital. He also referred to the good work of Coun. Neill in presenting the exigencies of the case to the County Council and of the council's most helpful gift of \$250. The president fittingly presented the thanks of the board to Coun. Neill.

The secretary-treasurer reported that Dr. Townsend was at the hospital last week (his second visit) to examine applicants for admission to the Jordan Sanatorium but the people with tubercular trouble are slow in obtaining expert advice. Dr. Townsend visits the hospital on the afternoon of the first Wednesday in each month.

The offer of \$50 from Dr. VanWart for an expert architect was placed in the hands of the Improvement Committee.

The secretary-treasurer was instructed to invite tenders for ninety tons of coal for the hospital, tenders to close in ten days and the award to be made by the president and the secretary. Several other matters were disposed of, after which the meeting closed.

terial proportion, the heavy taxes of production upon imported foodstuffs.

"Print paper, whose cost of production is as low in this country under favorable conditions, as it is anywhere in the world, has been transferred to the free list when worth less than 2½¢ pound, 11.48¢, while in the higher grades the tariff of 12 per cent. is in place 16.80 per cent. Copying paper has been cut from 42.32 per cent. to 30 per cent., bag envelopes etc., from 49.92 per cent. to 35 per cent., parchment, paper from 47.92 per cent. to 35 per cent., photographic paper from 28.99 per cent. to 25 per cent., writing paper from 45.12 per cent., common wrapping paper from 35 per cent. to 25 per cent., and books from 25 per cent. to 15 per cent.

The House Democrats will caucus the bill Tuesday and Chairman Underwood was confident tonight that it would be indorsed by an overwhelming vote.

The Senate Democrats had no plan tonight to hold a caucus on the bill, but such a meeting may be called later. The Senate Finance Committee Democrats held a three-hour consultation today, but apparently made little progress toward giving their indorsement to the bill as it now stands.

It was evident that Senators on the Finance Committee who have sounded out members of the party on the bill had not discovered a satisfactory margin to insure its passage. One-cent sugar with the free-in-three-years proviso and free wool are the stumbling blocks and the meeting today will be followed by further investigation to feel out the actual strength of the opposition.

The Senators in conference today were unable to agree upon the plan of the President and Mr. Underwood for one bill. They prefer separate bills and are not convinced that any advantage is to be gained by the other plan.

This question and that of the supposed anti-free wool and sugar combination will be discussed with Mr. Wilson tomorrow at a conference at the White House. The Senators hope to convince the President of the strategic value of schedule by schedule revision in keeping opposition Senators in line.

### LESS SURE OF THE SENATE

Chairman Underwood said he expected no serious opposition in the House. He added that after the caucus approved the bill the House would be given a week or 10 days for general debate upon it beginning Wednesday.

At the conclusion of the general debate the bill will be taken up paragraph by paragraph and amendments offered will be debated under the five minute rule. Mr. Underwood was of the opinion that the bill would pass the House about May 1. He would not express a decided opinion as to when the Senate might finish the bill but thought eight weeks might suffice.

The meeting of the Democrats of Senate Finance Committee did not result in a discussion of particular schedules but of general policy. It was plain, however that the threatened trouble over the prospect of free sugar and free wool was a source of embarrassment.

Leaders who wished to see the bill as it stands receive the committee's endorsement and that of the caucus were not certain how much strength the Senators opposed to these two schedules might be able to muster. There was less of the confidence that characterized former meetings and efforts to obtain a more accurate showing of how the forces are to line up will be continued.

There has been some dissatisfaction over the fact that Senators have had but little to do with framing a bill designed as a party measure. Today the Democrats of the Finance Committee got their first explanation of it from Chairman Underwood who was in conference with them for an hour and a half. Some of them are said to feel some hesitancy about taking immediate action approving the bill without fuller investigation.

It was suggested that although the measure is to be known as a party and Administration bill, its passage by caucus agreement and by use of pressure may lead to trouble within the party later if the States which are now protesting against certain schedules should be joined by still others.

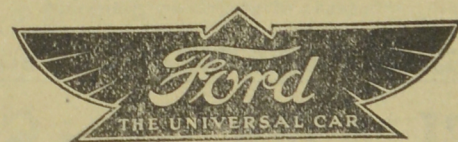
