TRAIN SERVICE

DISORGANIZED BY
BAD ACCIDENT

Freight Train Derailed Near South Bay—Passengers Transferred Over Break—No Mail Today From St. John

The service on the C.P.R. between this city and St. John is seriously disorganized as the result of an accident near South Bay. No mail or newspapers has reached this city from St. John today and passengers who should have arrived here at 9.10 a.m. did not get in until after one o'clock this afternoon. The break is one of the worst which has occurred on this part of the C.P.R. in some time and it now is doubtful if trains can get over it tonight.

The passengers on the west-bound train which was stalled at the break were transferred but the mail and express matter were left there and it is doubtful if they will be brought through tonight. Judge Landry, acting chief justice, at the April sittings of the Supreme Court this morning, stated that on account of the delay to the train, barristers would be given an opportunity to make common motions this afternoon.

The accident was caused by a freight train being derailed. Both cars and track were much damaged and it will take some time to effect repairs. The train was a large one. A car loaded with steel rails was one of those which left the track. A new automobile was in another of the derailed cars and was badly smashed. In all seven or eight cars left the rails.

A LONG WALK

Mr. Harry Fradsham of Lakeville Corner, who served with the Canadian contingent in the South African war, and was seriously wounded at Paardeberg, is among the visitors to the city, having been called here by the death of his father, the late Mr. Fred Fradsham. He got word of his father's critical illness on Saturday night, and on Sunday walked to the city, a distance of twenty-eight miles only to learn on arrival here in the evening that his father was dead and buried.

DECORATION FOR

MAJOR J. H. HATHORN
71st YORK REGT

Awarded Colonial Auxiliary Forces Officers' Decoration for Twenty Yrs. Service—Lt. Col. Wetmore Awarded Same

Major J. H. Hawthorn of the 71st York Regt., has been awarded the Colonial Auxiliary Forces Officers' Decoration. Notice of the award is contained in General Order 45 published in The Canada Gazette of Saturday last.

Major Hawthorn was appointed a provisional lieutenant in the 71st York Battalion in 1891 and received his confirmation of rank March 31 of the same year. He has served upwards of twenty years, which entitles an officer to the decoration but applied for it only two months ago. He first was appointed to No. 4 Company, now "D" Company. At that time the late R. M. Pinder was its commanding officer. Major Hawthorn became paymaster of the 71st
